The Henderson County Board of Commissioners met for a regularly scheduled meeting at 5:30 p.m. in the Commissioners' Meeting Room of the Historic Courthouse on Main Street, Hendersonville.

CALL TO ORDER/WELCOME

Chairman Thompson called the meeting to order, welcomed all in attendance.

The invocation was provided by County Manager Steve Wyatt.

CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION – STARS AND STRIPES AWARD

Chairman Thompson explained that Miss Katie Shehan had been awarded the American Heritage Girls Troop 1412 Stars and Stripes Award. Katie is 18 years old and the first recipient in WNC to receive the award, and the 2nd in North Carolina to receive the award. This award is considered as the American Heritage Girls equivalent to the Boy Scouts Eagle Scout Award, and requires 16 merit badges, leadership for 6 months, and a community service project. Miss Shehan's community service project was beautification at the Edneyville Fire Department. The Commissioners presented Katie with a Certificate of Recognition.

Public Hearing for Rezoning Application #R-2016-01 - Russell Galloway

Commissioner Messer made the motion to go into public hearing regarding Rezoning Application #r-2016-01. All voted in favor and the motion carried.


Planner Kyle Guie stated Rezoning Application #R-2016-01 which was initiated on March 15, 2016 at the request of applicant and agent, Mr. Russell Galloway, requests the County rezone approximately 67.34 acres of land (thereafter the "Subject Area") from Industrial (I) zoning to Residential One (R1) zoning.


The Henderson County Planning Board considered rezoning application #R-2016-01 at its regularly scheduled meeting on April 21, 2016. During that meeting, the Planning Board voted unanimously to send forward a favorable recommendation to rezone the Subject Area to a Residential One (R1) zoning district.

Before taking action on the application, the Board of Commissioners must hold a public hearing. In accordance with §42A-314(C) and §42A-337(B) of the Henderson County Land Development Code and State Law, notices of the June 6, 2016, public hearing regarding rezoning application #R-2016-01 were published in the Hendersonville Lightning on May 19, 2016 and May 26, 2016. The Planning Department sent notices of the hearing via first class mail to the owners of properties adjacent to the Subject Area on May 19, 2016 and the Subject Area property owners on May 17, 2016 and posted signs advertising the hearing on the Subject Area on May 23, 2016.






Zoning Overview

Public Input

- 1. David Sherman is a tenant in common. He feels if the property is returned to residential zoning, the owners will lose money.
- 2. Marilyn Sherman is wife of Johnny Sherman and heir to the estate. Their property is listed for sale and they would like for it to remain zoned industrial. If it is changed to residential, they will lose money.
- 3. Chuck Francis stated Jim Whitehurst is the owner of property adjacent to the subject property. The costal agri-business was located there because of the industrial zoning, and is not compatible with residential zoning. An investment has been made and he asked the Board to deny the request and leave the property zoned industrial.
- 4. Russell Galloway is the applicant. His property is connected to the agri-business supply company. Mr. Galloway does not feel that changing the zoning back to residential would change the business. He feels his rights were taken away without permission. Most of the landowners of the subject project are senior citizens with plans of leaving the property to their children, in order to build their homes. Mr. Galloway informed the Board that he would take this to court if necessary.
- 5. Rebecca Sherman stated the subject property was her grandparent's property. It is her dream to keep the property in the family. She asked the Board to rezone as residential.

Commissioner Hawkins made the motion to go out of public hearing. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Commissioner Edney inquired about the initial zoning and the advertising used.

June 6, 2016

John Mitchell explained that property was posted properly, and a ½ page advertisement was placed in the newspaper.

Commissioner Edney is concerned that a corporation owns part of the property and does not look as if the proper authority had signed the application. If this goes to court, it would show defects in the procedural details.

Commissioner Thompson noted that he was Chair of the Dana Small Area Plan which contained 9 members.

Commissioner Hawkins verified that Applicant Russell Galloway owns 2 of the 20 subject parcels.

Commissioner Edney made the motion for a continuance since the application was not property presented to the Board, allowing time for any defects to be addressed for procedural details and brought back before the Board at a later date. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

INFORMAL COMMENTS

- 1. Kimberly Heery has continued concern about the North Carolina General Statute in regards to building or renovating public school buildings. She said the plan for Hendersonville High School should go back to the Board of Education with an option to make changes as they see fit. Ms. Heery feels the commissioners are micro-managing and should instead allow the Board of Education to make decisions and choose a plan.
- 2. Amanda Fairley is with Waste Management. Recently they visited the Henderson County Transfer Station, and feel improvements need to be made. Waste Management is against flow control and feel Henderson County will see an increase of traffic at the Transfer Station with the Flow Control Ordinance.
- 3. Ken Fitch reminded the Board that more school nurses are needed.
- 4. Tom Hill is an alumni of Hendersonville High School and asked the Board to work together with the Board of Education. The alumni are still discussing the Stillwell Building and its use. He feels the ¼ cent sales tax referendum, if passed, should be used for teacher pay increases.

County Financial Report/Cash Balance Report - April

The April 2016 County Financial Report and Cash Balance Report were provided for the Board's review and approval.

The following are explanations for departments/programs with higher budget to actual percentages for the month of April:

- Dues/Non-Profit 4th quarter contributions were paid in March
- Facility Services a large workers compensation claim was incurred in March
- Rescue Squad 4th quarter approved non-profit contribution payment
- Soil & Water Conservation contracted services payments totaling \$185,000 have been expended in total as of the end of April
- Economic Development the budgeted amounts for Partnership for Economic Progress, Sierra Nevada and
- NC Rural Center have been expended in total as of the end of April
- Agri-Business operational expenditures to be covered by Agri-Business program fees to be transferred in
- Medical Services payments for autopsies conducted through April
- Mental Health 4th quarter payment was made in April

The YTD deficit in the Emergency Telephone System Fund is due to the purchase of technology capital outlay that has been budgeted. Fund balance has been appropriated to cover these technology expenditures.

The YTD deficit in the CDBG – Dodd Meadows Project Fund is temporary and due to a timing delay between the expenditure of grant funds on the project and the subsequent reimbursement of expended funds from the Division of Community Assistance.

The YTD deficit in the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Fund is from the transfer of the remaining funds available to the County's General Fund due to completion of participation in this federal program by the Sheriff's Department. Final ICE Program participation and funding ceased as of December 31, 2014.

The YTD deficit in the Westfeldt Park Project is due to the payment of project expenditures and the subsequent reimbursement of grant funds from the NCDENR – Recreational Trails Grant Program.

The YTD deficit in the Cane Creek Water & Sewer District Fund is due to ongoing expenditures for multiple sewer capital projects. A total of \$2.478 million in fund balance, primarily for these capital projects, was budgeted to balance this Fund and cover these capital expenditures in the current fiscal year.

Motion:

Smoky Mountain Center - Quarterly Fiscal Monitoring Report (FMP) for the quarter ended March 31, 2016

N.C.G.S. 122C-117(c) requires the staff of the local area mental health authority to provide the County Finance Officer with the quarterly Fiscal Monitoring Report (FMR) within 30 days of the end of the quarter. The County Finance Officer is then required to provide the FMR to the Board of Commissioners at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the board. The FMR for the Smoky Mountain Center was received by the County Finance Officer on April 30, 2016.

Motion:

I move that the Board of Commissioners approves the Smoky Mountain Center Fiscal Monitoring Report for the quarter ended March 31, 2016.

Energy Management Update

The report provides information to the Board about the County's energy use across all County facilities in the areas of electricity, natural gas, and water/sewer. It compares the current FY 3rd quarter with the previous year to illustrate historical trends in commodity consumption. Supplementary cost analyses represent the monthly cost profile comparing 2015 and 2016 YTD for the highest-cost commodity at each facility. Selected fuel consumption information is also provided for the current FY 3rd quarter period.

HCCBG Allocation Recommendations

Each year, the Board of Commissioners is required to adopt a Funding Plan for the Home & Community Care Block Grant for Older Adults and identify the lead office or agency responsible for coordinating the County Funding Plan. The Home & Community Care Block Grant is a State/Federal program administered at the local level. The proposed Funding Plan supports the service priorities identified for the current planning cycle.

At this time, the HCCBG funding for FY2017 is estimated to be \$776,834.

Motion:

I move that the Board appoints the County Manager's office as the Lead Agency and approves the proposed FY2017 Funding Plan.

Walk of Fame Steering Committee Revised Charter

At the February 2, 2015 Board of Commissioners Meeting, Tom Orr presented for the Board's consideration, the concept for a "Walk of Fame" Committee. The purpose of the Committee would be to determine a means by which to recognize outstanding contributors to the growth and development of Henderson County. The Charter was originally approved on April 15, 2015, and revised on June 24, 2015.

The City of Hendersonville has requested the Board consider revising the Charter, with the proposed changes reflected in red on the draft provided. Primarily, the proposed revisions establish that a steering committee will serve as the selection committee, and that the selection of the Chairman will be determined by a vote of the members. Additionally the revision proposes that the City's 3rd member shall be the Public Works Director or their designee, serving in an ex-officio capacity. Staff supports this recommendation, since the Walk will primarily be located in Downtown Hendersonville, and City resources would be needed to install and maintain any proposed plaques of monuments.

Motion:

I move the Board approves the revised Charter and By-Laws for the Walk of Fame Steering Committee as presented.

Budget Amendment – DSS

The Department of Social Services and Facility Services is requesting that the Board approves a budget amendment necessary to renovate an existing space in the Department of Social Services into offices.

The total cost to convert existing breakroom into offices, construct new restrooms and other associated construction is estimated to be \$145,000. Facility Services will be performing a portion of the work, with a contractor performing the buildout of the office space.

The project is transforming existing space in the Human Services building, not utilizing any of the "future space".

Motion:

I move the Board of Commissioners approves the Budget Amendment which moves the approved funding for this project from the DSS budget to Facility Services.

Mills River – Sheriff's Proposal

At the Board's May 18, 2016 meeting, the Board discussed a proposal to offer law enforcement services to Mills River with a phased enactment over the course of three budget cycles, with full implementation in FY2019. The Board approved a motion to "offer the package to Mills River and see what response is received." Staff contacted Mills River following the meeting, and conveyed the offer.

June 6, 2016

Mills River has responded that they do wish to accept the proposal, which would begin July 1, 2016. The Board is requested to discuss the response, determine if it wishes to engage in a contract with Mills River going forward, and direct staff accordingly.

It was the Board's understanding that with the manning of two positions to Mills River, two additional manning positions will open in the Sheriff's Department using the revenue to cover the positions.

Motion:

I move the Board directs Staff to develop a contract for the provision of law enforcement services in Mills River, annually determine the cost for provision of these services at 100% cost recovery, include that cost in the contract, and authorize the Chairman to execute the contract.

Pilgrim HOME loan program document request

In 2000, a "HOME" program loan was made, as shown on the documents provided. A correction of promissory note was attempted in October of 2002, also as shown. This document was incorrectly executed and acknowledged.

From available records, in the 1990s, "HOME" loans did not automatically terminate if the recipient lived in the property which was improved by and the collateral for the loan for a period of ten years. This feature changed before this loan was made, but the paperwork prepared by outside counsel evidently was not corrected from previous forms. When, two years after the loan was originally made an attempt was made at such correction, it was not properly executed or acknowledged by the County.

Notwithstanding all those facts, the recipient of the loan has evidently in fact resided in the property for a period of greater than ten years. This would allow the lien on the property represented by the County's deed of trust to be withdrawn (noted on records as "Satisfied"), and the loan permanently forgiven.

Motion:

I move that the Board directs staff to properly execute and acknowledge the Satisfaction of Security Instrument in this matter.

Proclamation – June 18-25 as Pollinator Week

The Henderson County Board of Commissioners is requested to proclaim the week of June 18-25, 2016 as Pollinator Week and encourage all Henderson County officials, employees, schools and residents to participate in local Pollinator Week activities.

A variety of educational and interactive events for all ages are scheduled to take place throughout Henderson County during the week of June 18-25, 2016, hosted by certified Hendersonville Bee City USA® with partners from local non-profits, businesses, camps, and conservation organizations.

Motion:

I move that the Board adopts the Proclamation designating June 18-25, 2016 as Pollinator Week.

Chairman Thompson made the motion to add to the base budget of all future budgets a school nurse each year until we have met the standard of 1 for every 750 students. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Chairman Thompson made the motion to fully fund the Henderson County Public Schools at their request of \$1,394,230. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Chairman Thompson made the motion to allocate \$60,577 for additional salary cost to the Cooperative Extension. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Chairman Thompson made the motion to fund public safety advanced training pay for the Sheriff's Department in the amount of \$229,895.00, the Detention Center in the amount of \$32,683.00, and EMS in the amount of \$222,108.00 as defined by Assistant County Manager Amy Brantley. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Commissioner Messer made the motion to fund an additional 2% pay increase for all (182) employees of the Sheriff's Department and Detention Center at a cost of \$145,860.00. The motion passed 4-1 with Commissioner Lapsley voting nay.

Chairman Thompson made the motion to earmark \$1,283,332.00 to build an inside training facility for law enforcement debt service. The motion passed 4-1 with Commissioner Lapsley voting nay.

It was the consensus of the Board that over the next year staff conduct and internal review of all departments looking at positions where we are unable to recruit or retain employees and salary is the issue.

Vice-Chairman Messer made the motion to approve a budget amendment for \$966,900 from the Bent Creek Fund for the Detention Center roof. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Commissioner Hawkins made the motion to refund Fire Inspection fee payments over the next two years with those first paid being the first refunded, and last paid being refunded last in the total amount of \$200,000.00. The motion failed 1-4 with Commissioners Messer, Thompson, Lapsley and Edney voting nay.

Chairman Thompson made the motion to fund the additional membership fee to NCACC in the amount of \$103.00. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Commissioner Lapsley made the motion to approve a budget amendment for the current year moving funds (\$570,000.00) from Bent Creek to Dana Park in the amount of \$150,000, and Tuxedo Park in the amount of \$150,000 for equipment, \$230,000 to Jackson Park for Tennis Courts, and \$40,000 to Jackson Park for scoreboards, fencing and portable score platforms at Fields 8 & 9. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Commissioner Edney made the motion to approve funding for non-profit Interfaith Assistance and non-profit Medical Loan Closet at \$4500.00 each. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Chairman Thompson made the motion to include in the budget a new EMS ambulance, staff and equipment at a cost of \$651,936. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

DECLARATION OF DEED RESTRICTIONS HOME Program

THIS DECLARATION OF DEED RESTRICTIONS ("Declaration"), made and entered into as of <u>September 5</u>, 2000, by and between <u>Carolyn N. Pilgrim</u> (the "Owner"), for the benefit of and enforceable by <u>Henderson County</u> (the "Lender");

WHEREAS, the Owner is the owner of a certain tract of real property, more particularly described on <u>Exhibit</u> A attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference ("Property"); and

WHEREAS, Lender has made a loan to Owner in the original principal amount of \$28.375.00 (the "Lender"), evidence by a promissory note dated September 5, 2002 and secured by a deed of trust of even date with the promissory note and recorded in the Book 911, Page 264, Henderson County Registry; and

WHEREAS, the Loan was made to provide assistance to a residential housing project with one unit(s) to be acquired, constructed or rehabilitated with the proceeds of the Loan, and with a known street address of 715 North Whitted Street, Hendersonville, NC 28791 for the Property ("Project") pursuant to the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (24 CFR Part 92) ("Program Regulations"), which Program Regulations, amount other things, restrict the use of Program assistance to property which will provide affordable housing for at least minimum period of time as prescribed therein; and that the Owner occupy the Property as his/her principal residence; and

WHEREAS, as a condition of making the Loan to Owner, Lender has required and Owner has agreed to restrict the Property as set forth herein;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and understandings set forth herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Owner hereby represents, covenants, warrants and agree:

1. <u>Minimum Program Restrictions</u>. At all times during the Term of this Declaration the Owner and the Project shall comply with all the regulations affecting recipient owner and a qualifying project pursuant to the Program Regulations, as the same may be amended from time to time, including, but not limited to the following:

The project shall qualify as and shall be maintained as "affordable housing" as prescribed in the applicable Program Regulation (24 CFR Part 92.255) based on the Owner's application for Program assistance and shall be suitable for occupancy.

2. Term. This Declaration shall remain in full force and effect for a period of 10 years from date hereof, which period must also equal or exceed the loan term of the HOME Program Loan to the Owner that closed on the same date of this Declaration; however, this Declaration period shall in no event be less than the required minimum period of affordability under the applicable Program Regulations ("Period of Affordability"). This declaration shall automatically terminate in the event of transfer of title by foreclosure

or by deed in lieu of foreclosure, or if pursuant to 24 CFR Part 92.254 (a)(5)(i)(A) assignment of an FHA insured mortgage to HUD, subject to automatic revival, if, at any time during the remainder of the original Period of Affordability, the owner of record immediately prior to the termination event, or any business ties, obtains an ownership interest in the Project or the Property. It is understood and agreed that the Term of this Declaration may extend beyond the term of the Loan or may be terminated by the Lender upon full ad satisfactory repayment of the Loan prior to the full term of the Declaration at the sole discretion of the Lender.

- herein (i) shall be deemed covenants running with the land and shall pass to and be binding upon Owner, the Owner's heirs, successors and assigns in title to the Property and all subsequent owners or operators of the Project and (ii) are not merely personal covenants of the Owner. The benefits shall inure to the Lender and any present or prospective tenants of the project during the term of this Agreement. The Owner hereby agrees that any and all requirement of the laws of the State of North Carolina to be satisfied in order for the provisions of this Agreement to constitute deed restrictions and covenants running with the Property and which touch and concern the Property, shall be deemed to be satisfied in full, and that any requirements of privity of estate are intending to be satisfied, and that an equitable servitude in the form of a negative easement has been created to insure that these restrictions run with the land. Each and every contract, deed or other instrument hereafter executed covering or conveying the Property or the Project or any portion thereof shall conclusively be held to have been executed, delivered and accepted subject to such covenants, reservations and restrictions are set forth in such contract, deed or other instruments. If a portion or portions of the Project are conveyed, all of such covenants, reservations and restrictions shall run to each portion of the Project.
- 4. <u>Compliance Monitoring</u>. The Owner agrees to permit, during normal business hours and upon reasonable notice, any duly authorized representation of the Lender to inspect any books and records of the Owner regarding the Project which pertain to compliance with this Agreement. The Owner shall submit any other information, documents or certifications requested by Lender which the Lender shall deem reasonably necessary to substantiate the Owner's continuing compliance with the Program, Program Regulations and this Agreement.
- 5. Remedies: Enforceability. The Owner and Lender acknowledge that the primary purpose for requiring compliance by the Owner with the restrictions provided in this Agreement is to assure compliance of the Project and the Owner with the Progra, Program Regulations and additional Lender restrictions. AND BY REASON THEREOF, THE OWNER IN CONSIDERATION FOR RECEIVING THE LOAN FOR THIS PROJECT HEREBY AGREES AND CONSENTS THAT THE LENDER AND ANY INDIVIDUAL WHO MEETS THE INCOME LIMITATIONS APPLICABLE UNDER THE PROGRAM (WHETHER PROSPECTIVE, PRESENT OR FORMER OCCUPANT) SHALL BE ENTITLED, FOR ANY BREACH OF THE PROVISIONS HEREOF, AND IN ADDITION TO ALL OTHER REMEDIES PROVIDED BY LAW OR IN EQUITY, TO OBTAIN SPECIFIC PERFORMANCE BY THE OWNER OF ITS OBLIGATIONS UNDER THIS AGREEMENT IN ANY COURT OF COMPETENT JURISDICTION. The Owner further specifically acknowledges that the beneficiaries of the Owner's obligations hereunder cannot be adequately compensated by monetary damages in the event of any default hereunder.

The provisions hereof are imposed upon and made applicable to the Property and shall run with the land and shall be enforceable against Owner or any other person or entity that has or had an ownership interest in the Project at the time of such violation or attempted violation. No delay in enforcing the provisions hereof as

to any breach or violations shall impair, damage or waive the right of any party entitled to enforce the provisions hereof or to obtain relief against or recover for the continuation or repitition of such breach or violations or any similar breach of violation hereof at any later time or times.

- 6. <u>Amendment</u>. This declaration shall not be amended or, except otherwise provided herein, terminated except by written instrument, executed by the Lender and the Owner, or their successors or assigns, which amendment shall be duly recorded in the Office of the Register of Deeds for the county in which the Property is located.
- 7. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision hereof shall be invalid, illegal or unenforceable, the validity, legality, and enforceability of the remaining portions hereof shall not in any way be affected or impaired thereby.
- 8. <u>Construction</u>. Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, as used in this Declaration words of the masculine, feminine or neuter gender shall be construed to include any plural number, and vice versa, when appropriate. This Declaration and all the terms and provisions hereof shall be construed to effectuate the purposes set forth herein and to sustain the validity hereof.
- 9. <u>Headings</u>. The titles and headings of the sections of this Declaration have been inserted for convenience of reference only and are not to be considered a part hereof and shall not in any way modify or restrict any of the terms or provisions hereof, or in ascertaining intent if any questions of intent shall arise.
- 10. Governing Law. This Declaration shall be governed by the laws of the State of North Carolina.

Henderson County, North Carolina Budget Ordinance Fiscal Year July 1, 2016 – June 30, 2017

Preamble

The County Manager's proposed budget for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2016, and ending June 30, 2017 ("FY2017") was presented to the Henderson County Board of Commissioners on May 2, 2016, pursuant to the North Carolina Local Government Fiscal Control and Budget Act, Article 3 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes. The Board of Commissioners considered the proposal, deliberated concerning it, and then held a public hearing on the budget pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §159-12 on May 18, 2016.

The following Ordinance was offered by Commissioner Thompson, on June 6, 2016, who moved its adoption. The vote on this motion was as is shown below.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF HENDERSON COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA, THIS 6th DAY OF JUNE, 2016:

Section 1 - General Fund

A. General Fund Appropriations

The following General Fund amounts are hereby appropriated to the County Manager for the operation of the Henderson County Government and its departments and agencies for FY2017. Other fund amounts as set forth in this Ordinance are also appropriated as presented in this section. Appropriations for land and new buildings included in this Ordinance may be expended only after release by the Board of Commissioners.

The County Manager or the Manager's designee is hereby authorized to execute all necessary agreements within funds included in the Budget Ordinance in departments subject to his control for the following purposes, and on the following terms and conditions:

- A) Grant agreements with public and non-profit agencies;
- B) Leases of normal and routine business equipment;
- C) Consultant, professional, or maintenance service agreements with a up to an anticipated contract amount of \$50,000;
- D) Purchase of supplies and materials when formal bids are not required by law, pursuant to the Manager's purchasing policy;
- E) Agreements for acceptance of State and Federal grant funds;
- F) Construction or repair work where formal bids are not required by law; and
- G) County departments shall not enter into contracts requiring formal bid procedures without having met with and received written approval from the County Manager.
- H) The Finance Director is hereby directed to release board-approved non-profit grants in quarterly installments upon the execution of and compliance with the funding agreement required by the County.
- The Finance Director may advance funds with the permission of the County Manager to the Sheriff's Department for their use in drug enforcement activities, for ultimate return by the Sheriff's Department.
- J) The County Manager may authorize pilot programs for the County's departments, and evaluate such programs for effectiveness and efficiency.
- In addition to the foregoing, the Sheriff may execute contracts that require no expenditure and have no negative fiscal impact on the county government budget (for example, a contract requiring no county match in personnel or funding). Contracts or agreements that require any type of County match outside of the Sheriff's approved budget must be approved by the Board of Commissioners. Further, in the absence of express authority from Federal or State Court, all seizure transactions shall comply with N.C. Gen. Stat. §15-11.1

E) For purposes of the County Personnel Policies, Employee and Retiree Benefits, years of service to Henderson County shall include all prior years of service, whether consecutive or not.

The County Manager or the Manager's designee is hereby authorized to execute necessary agreements with regard to ongoing construction projects undertaken by the County, without the requirement of consultation with the Board of Commissioners, in the following circumstances:

- A) The Manager may approve any and all non-emergency change orders which do not increase the construction budget for the project by more than 25% of the then-unallocated budgeted amount for "contingencies" in the particular project budget.
- B) Any change order approved by the County Manager involving a change of more than \$10,000.00 to the construction budget shall be reported to the Board of Commissioners, as an information-only item within the County Manager's monthly report.
- C) In emergencies, change orders greater than those authorized above may be approved by the County Manager after consultation with and with the approval of the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners. In any such case, a report of the same shall be made to the Board of Commissioners at their next regularly-scheduled meeting.

The County Manager is hereby authorized to transfer appropriations within a fund as contained herein under the following conditions:

- A) The Manager may transfer amounts between objects of expenditure within a department without limitation and without a report being required.
- B) The Manager may transfer amounts up to \$50,000 between departments within the same fund with an official report on such transfers provided to the Board of Commissioners.
- C) The Manager may transfer amounts up to \$50,000 from any appropriation within the general fund to a separate fund with an official report on such transfers provided to the Board of Commissioners.
- D) The Manager may modify the budget for pass-through monies, additional funding, or any Federal or State program prior approved by the Board, without a report being required.
- E) The total of all amounts encumbered for outstanding purchase orders and contracts at June 30, 2016, shall be carried forward in fund balance as the amount Reserved for Encumbrances and the corresponding appropriations for these encumbrances shall not lapse in order to properly account for the payment in the fiscal year paid.

The County's authorized general fund appropriations are as shown on Appendix A hereto, which is incorporated herein by reference.

B. Revenues

For the operation of the Henderson County's government and its subdivisions for FY2017, it is estimated that the revenues and fund balances of the General Fund will be available to meet the appropriations as set forth herein. All fees, commissions, and sums paid to or collected in any fund by any County official, officer, or agent for any service performed for such official, officer, or agent in his official capacity shall accrue solely to the benefit of the County and become County funds.

The County's estimated general fund revenues are as shown on Appendix A hereto, which is incorporated herein by reference.

1. Ad Valorem Tax Levy

That there is hereby levied for FY2017 an *ad valorem* property tax at the rate shown in Appendix A hereto, which is incorporated herein by reference, for the purpose of raising the revenue for current year's taxes as set forth in the foregoing estimates of revenues, and in order to finance the foregoing appropriations, pursuant to and in accordance with the North Carolina Machinery Act (codified within Chapter 105 of the North Carolina General Statutes) and other applicable laws. This rate is based on an estimated total valuation of \$13,230,227,518 of taxable property and a collection rate of ninety-seven percent (97%). The Budget Ordinance also names ad valorem property taxes as the specific revenue source to fund the Tax Revaluation Reserve Fund, budgeted in FY2017 as shown in Appendix C hereto, which is incorporated herein by reference.

2. Fees, Licenses and Other Taxes

There is hereby levied all County Privilege License Taxes as authorized by North Carolina General Statutes, and such other taxes and fees, as provided in the ordinances, resolutions, and fee schedules duly adopted by the Board of Commissioners. Fee schedules used in the development of this budget and adopted by the Board of Commissioners are set forth and a copy of such is maintained in the Office of the County Manager.

C. Based on the Annual Budget

The appropriations, schedules of expected revenues, and taxes levied, as stated herein, are based on the annual Budget as hereby approved, a summary of which Budget is attached as Schedule No. 1 to Appendix A, and the terms of which Budget are hereby specifically incorporated by reference.

Section 2 - Fire Districts Fund

There are hereby appropriations and revenues estimated to be available in the Fire Districts Fund for FY2017 for payment to the appropriate corporation providing fire protection within each district as shown on Appendix B hereto, which is incorporated by reference.

Section 3 – Other Funds

There are hereby appropriations and revenues estimated to be available in special County budget funds as shown in Appendix C hereto, which is incorporated herein by reference.

Section 4 - Public Schools

The Henderson County Finance Director is hereby directed to remit the appropriation to the Henderson County Public Schools in monthly installments equivalent to one-twelfth (1/12) of the total county appropriation. The County Finance Director shall remit payment by not later than the thirtieth (30th) of each month.

Section 5 - Elected Officials

Henderson County elected officials shall be compensated as shown on Appendix D, which is incorporated herein by reference.

Section 6 – Use of Budget

This Ordinance and the budget shall be the basis for the financial plan for the County of Henderson, North Carolina, during FY2017. The County Manager shall administer the budget and insure that operation officials are provided guidance and information in sufficient detail to implement their portions of the budget.

The Finance Director shall establish records, which are in consonance with the budget, this Ordinance and regulating statutes of the State of North Carolina.

Notwithstanding other Ordinances, Resolutions or other adoptions of this Board, all County citizens shall have the right to use Henderson County's parks and other recreation facilities free of any admission charge, subject to regularly adopted and customary scheduling, participation fees, and other regulations.

APPENDIX D

PUBLIC OFFICIALS COMPENSATION

A. Henderson County Board of Public Education

The Chairman of the Board shall be compensated at an annual rate of \$4,500. Members of the Board, other than the Chair, shall be compensated at \$3,600 annually.

B. Henderson County Board of Commissioners

(1) Salary

The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners shall be compensated at an annual rate of \$19,194 paid on the same basis as other county employees. Members of the Board, other than the Chair, shall be compensated at an annual rate of \$11,917 paid on the same basis as other county employees.

(2) Expenses and Special Meetings

The Chairman and Members shall also receive an additional \$75 per special-called meeting and \$3,650 annually for in-county travel expenses.

C. Sheriff

The Sheriff shall be compensated at an annual rate of \$ 106,541. Notwithstanding, the Board reserves the right to adjust this salary pursuant to North Carolina law.

D. Register of Deeds

The Register of Deeds shall be compensated at an annual rate of \$ 73,310. Notwithstanding, the Board reserves the right to adjust this salary pursuant to North Carolina law.
