The Henderson County Board of Commissioners met for a regularly scheduled meeting at 9:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Meeting Room of the Historic Courthouse on Main Street, Hendersonville.

CALL TO ORDER/WELCOME

Chairman Thompson called the meeting to order and welcomed all in attendance.

INVOCATION

The invocation was provided by County Manager Steve Wyatt.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag was led by Larry Rogers of the Partnership for Economic Progress.

PROCLAMATION – IN RECOGNITION OF APRIL AS NATIONAL AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH

The Henderson County Board of Commissioners are requested to proclaim the month of April as Henderson County Autism Awareness Month and encourage all Henderson County officials, employees, schools and residents to recognize and commend the parents, relatives, and educators of children with autism for their dedication in providing for the special needs of children with autism.

Harlan Chumley, from St. Gerard House, stated Adam Farris had asked him to speak and he is currently working and was unable to attend the meeting. This item is very important to Mr. Farris as he is Autistic. He thanked the Board for adopting the Proclamation on behalf of all autistic individuals struggling with Autism and their families.

Commissioner Lapsley read the Proclamation aloud.

Commissioner Lapsley made the motion that the Board adopts the Proclamation designating the month of April as National Autism Awareness Month in Henderson County. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Chairman Thompson read the Resolution aloud.

Chairman Thompson made the motion that the Board adopts the Resolution observing “We Are Hope” substance abuse awareness week in Henderson County Public Schools’ high schools and middle schools. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

NORTH CAROLINA OPEN GOVERNMENT COALITION'S SUNSHINE AWARD

Sunshine Day 2016 will mark the second annual awards program from the Sunshine Center recognizing individuals from across North Carolina whose work exemplifies the value they place on keeping citizens informed about government.

Attorney Russ Burrell was presented the Award on Monday, March 14, 2016. The purpose of the N. C. Open Government Coalition's Government Award is to recognize individuals, and occasionally agencies, within government who have provided outstanding access to public information. That outstanding access may be exemplified by such things as excellence in communication with records seekers, innovation in delivery, and internal training programs.

Mr. Jonathan Jones, Director of the North Carolina Open Government Coalition, had shared the following information by email. They were honored to award Mr. Burrell the 2016 Sunshine Award in Government. They started the awards program in 2015 in four categories: advocacy, government, journalism, and citizenship.

Government: The purpose of the N.C. Open Government Coalition's Government Award is to recognize individuals, and occasionally agencies, within government who have provided outstanding access to public information. That outstanding access may be exemplified by such things as excellence in communication with records seekers, innovation in delivery, and internal training programs.

Mr. Burrell was nominated for his excellent work responding to public records requests. The individual who nominated Mr. Burrell was undisclosed but stated the following:

"Mr. Burrell is knowledgeable on the state's open records and open meetings law. He responds quickly to records requests. His response is generally the fastest in Western North Carolina.

His philosophy, in my experience, is positive. He tends to take the view that records are open to inspection from the start instead of the view that they are secret from the start unless proven otherwise. This view means Henderson County residents have a better chance of understanding the operations of their government when those operations are relevant to the news or current events."

Lastly, I'll say that it's particularly telling that when I had the chance to inform Mr. Burrell we wished to honor him for doing excellent work in responding to records requests, his response was "You mean for doing my job?" I have great appreciation for government officials who see transparency that way.

The Board congratulated Mr. Burrell on his achievement.

RECOGNITION

Chairman Thompson recognized Deputy Ken McCraw who was serving as security for the meeting. He thanked him for "watching our backs".

DISCUSSION/ADJUSTMENT OF CONSENT AGENDA

Commissioner Hawkins made the motion to approve the Consent Agenda with the addition of Item G - Application for Special Use Permit Amendment. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Tax Collector’s Report

Collections Specialist Luke Small had presented the Tax Collector’s Report to the Commissioners dated March 3, 2016 for information only. No action was required.

Emergency Management/Rescue Coordinator Position

The Henderson County Board of Commissioners is requested to approve the creation of a new project position, with the title of Emergency Management / Rescue Coordinator. The position will report to the Emergency Management Director, and will be responsible for coordinating non-emergency transportation services with the Rescue Squad, Technical Rescue Coordination, Emergency Planning, Response, Recovery, Mitigation and Preparedness activities. If approved, the Emergency Management Department anticipates that the time frame for the recruitment process would allow for a start date in mid-May. No additional funding would be required in the FY16 budget.

Motion:

I move that the Board approves the creation of the Emergency Management/Rescue Coordinator Position as presented.

Public Record Disposal Request – EMS

Emergency Medical Services wishes to dispose of Ambulance Call Reports for year 2004. The eleven year period for retention required by the North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources has expired. Ambulance Call Reports which included minors and/or disabled patients will not be destroyed. EMS wishes to dispose of EMS Billing Remittance and write-off authorization records through year 2012. The three year period for retention required by the North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources has expired. EMS also wishes to dispose of DEA Controlled Medication documents, the two year period for retention required by the US Department of Justice has expired.

Motion:

I move the Board approves the disposal of the Ambulance Call Reports, EMS Billing Remittances, and the DEA Controlled Medication documents.

Revisions to Weapons and Parks ordinances

Recent revisions to North Carolina statutes have caused the County’s ordinances regarding weapons to become non-compliant. However, rather than merely requiring the non-enforcement of the non-compliant law, the latest statutory change (S.L. 2015-195) imposes a penalty of sorts on local government:

A person adversely affected by any ordinance, rule, or regulation promulgated or caused to be enforced by any unit of local government in violation of this section may bring an action for declaratory and injunctive relief and for actual damages The court shall award the prevailing party . . . reasonable attorneys’ fees and court costs.

The proposed ordinance changes were drafted with consultation with Sheriff’s Office Staff Attorney Jason Smith, and are intended to bring the Code provisions involving the parks and involving weapons into compliance with the General Statutes.

Motion:

I move that the Board adopts the proposed amendments to the Code.

Closing of a Portion of Cloverdale Drive (SR 1530)

Staff received a petition to abandon state maintenance and close the Right of Way (ROW) for a portion of Cloverdale Drive (SR 1530). A copy of the petition requesting the closing was included in the agenda packet.

Under N.C. Gen. Stat. 153A-241, you have the power to close any public road or easement not within a city,

except public roads or easements for public roads under control of the Department of Transportation. To do so, the Board must:

- Vote to adopt a resolution declaring its intent to close the public road or easement
- Call and notice a public hearing on closing the road or easement, with notice “reasonably calculated to give full and fair disclosure of the proposed closing to be published once a week for three successive weeks before the hearing, a copy of the resolution to be sent by registered or certified mail to each owner as shown on the county tax records of property adjoining the public road or easement who did not join in the request to have the road or easement closed, and a notice of the closing and public hearing to be prominently posted in at least two places along the road or easement”.
- Hold the public hearing, where the Board must “hear all interested persons who appear with respect to whether the closing would be detrimental to the public interest or to any individual property rights”.
- Then, if the Board “is satisfied that closing the public road or easement is not contrary to the public interest and (in the case of a road) that no individual owning property in the vicinity of the road or in the subdivision in which it is located would thereby be deprived of reasonable means of ingress and egress to his property, the Board may adopt an order closing the road or easement”.
- File a copy of the Board’s order with the Register of Deeds.

Motion:

I move that the Board adopts the proposed resolution and set the public hearing for May 18, 2016 at 9:00 am.

Application for Special Use Permit Amendment

Pardee Hospital is in the process of demolishing two buildings along US 62, to reconfigure the lots for parking. One of the lots where the buildings are situated is deeded to Henderson County. In order to proceed with the demolition, Pardee Hospital has requested that the Board approve an Application for Special Use Permit Amendment, allowing the demolition of the buildings to proceed. There is no cost to the County required for the demolition.

Motion:

I move the Board approves the Application for Special use Permit Amendment, and authorizes the Chairman to execute it as submitted, allowing for the demolition of the buildings.

There were no nominations at this time and this item was rolled to the next meeting.

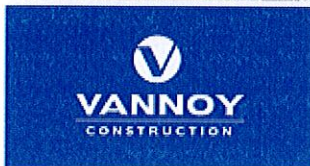
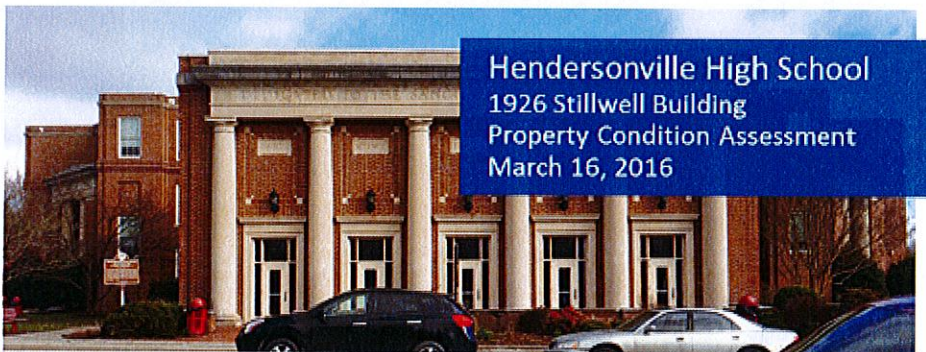

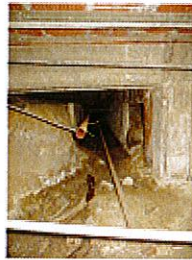

STRUCTURAL ELEMENTS



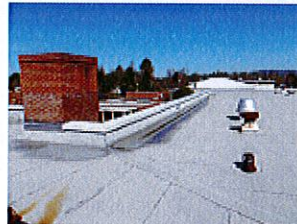

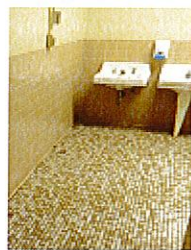

INTERIORS AND ELEVATOR

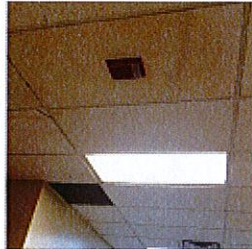

Seating in the auditorium needs replacement for egress.

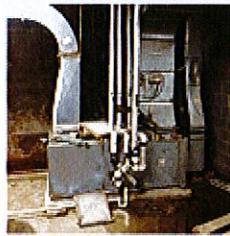

Commissioner Lapsley thanked Vannoy for their detailed report, at no cost to the county. He noted that all information will be put together and evaluated, hopefully with a decision by April. There may be unforeseen things that come up, but renovation is worth considering at \$13.5 million.

Jim Young of Vannoy Construction stated the analysis of the interior is visually in better condition than previously thought. There may be underlying problems however that cannot be seen.

Commissioner Hawkins questioned if during research Vannoy Construction had come up with any previous documents or drawings of the building.

Jim Young responded the County had provided some documents, and the School Board had provided 1990-1992 renovations drawings by Ash Architects. No structural documents have been found.

Mr. Young stated the balcony in the auditorium is a big issue, along with handicapped bathroom accessibility.

Brian Walker noted that use of the building will make a big difference, and determine life expectancy of the building. A consultant needs to do a further study. For example, if the building is not used for classrooms, only one stair tower would be necessary.

Commissioner Messer stated this will probably be a four year process and a hard decision. Everyone will not agree with any plan.

Commissioner Edney congratulated Bo Caldwell on his recent appointment as School Superintendent. He questioned the remaining life of the building, loss of chairs in the auditorium, and the useful life after renovations. He also questioned if any soft costs were included in the estimate.

Jim Young explained that water intrusion will shorten the life of the building. The elevator can last a little longer. He feels with ADA compliance the auditorium will lose between 15-20 chairs per floor. If water intrusion is removed with renovation, building life will be approximately 25 years. With further proper renovations the building would have the same life as a new building. Only hard costs were included in the estimate, no FF& E, technology, architect, security, or specialists.

Mr. Young also reported that Vannoy did not find any asbestos, however, it could be there. He does not see any major additional costs.

Chairman Thompson recognized Laurel Park Mayor Carey O'Cain in the audience and thanked him for his previous input.

Commissioner Thompson stated, as once said by the County Manager, the Board is going through a thoughtful, deliberate process. He asked Mr. Young and Mr. Walker, if the outside walls and columns are in good shape, is Vannoy recommending that drainage be repaired and the building be gutted?

Mr. Young responded the water intrusion should be dealt with and exterior repaired to prevent further damage. All interior walls can be removed since they are not weight bearing walls.

Board of Education Chairman Irvin Bazzle thanked the Board for getting all the facts before making a decision. These decisions will be costly but are important.

Laurel Park Mayor Carey O'Cain asked about the schedule.

Brian Walker responded that the timeframe was not analyzed.

Commissioner Lapsley stated his perception with architectural renovations would be 18-24 months.

Commissioner Thompson noted the Board of Commissioners will be working with the School Board and their Superintendent. No decision will be made today.

HEALTH SCIENCES CENTER UPDATE

Staff provided an update to the Board of Commissioners on the status of the Health Sciences Center. David Berry reported the project is within schedule and budget. This has been the wettest winter making it difficult.



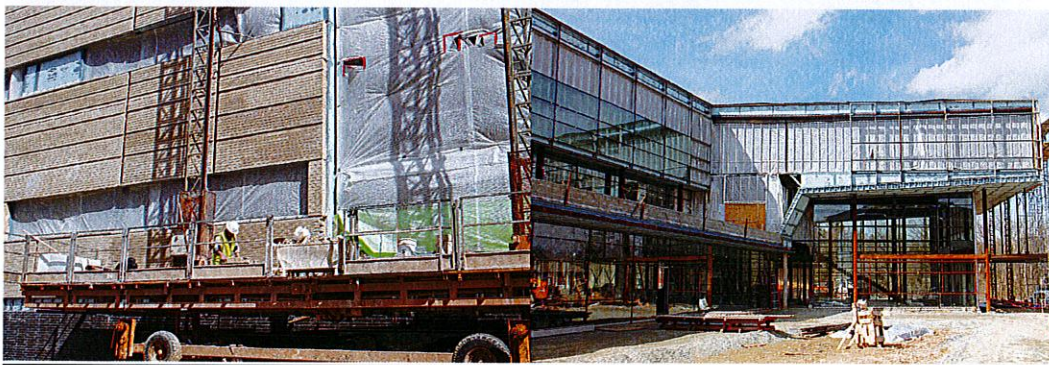
A change order was requested by Pardee for additional parking on Oak Street at no cost to the County. Pardee will be funding it. The parking lot can be started as soon as construction material is removed.

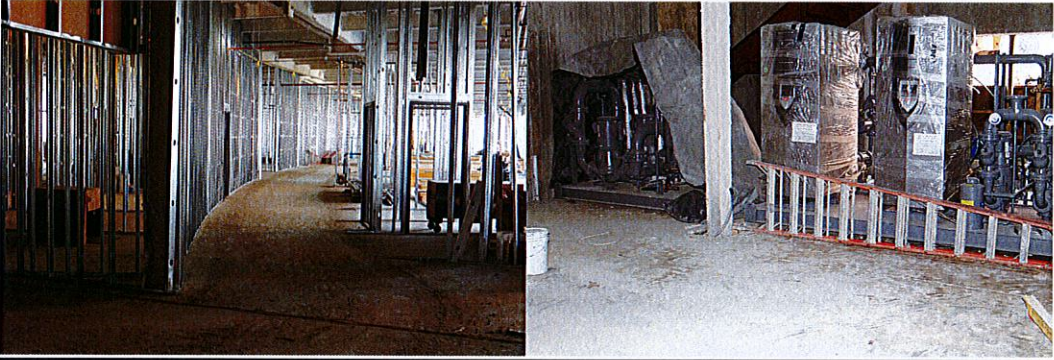


Stadium seating framework



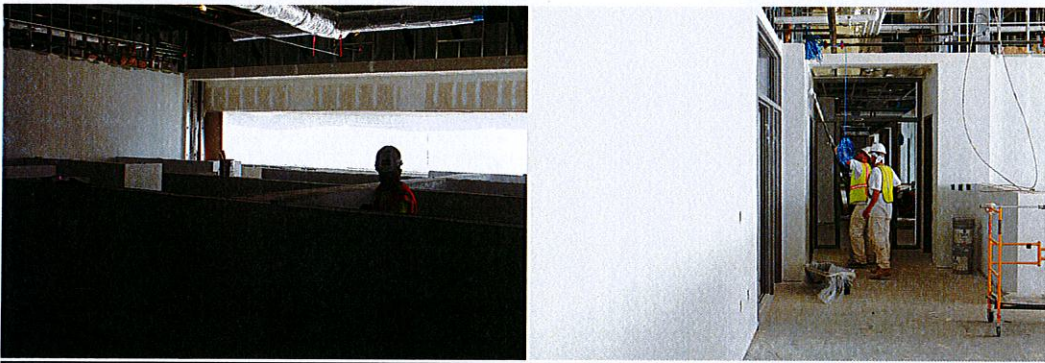

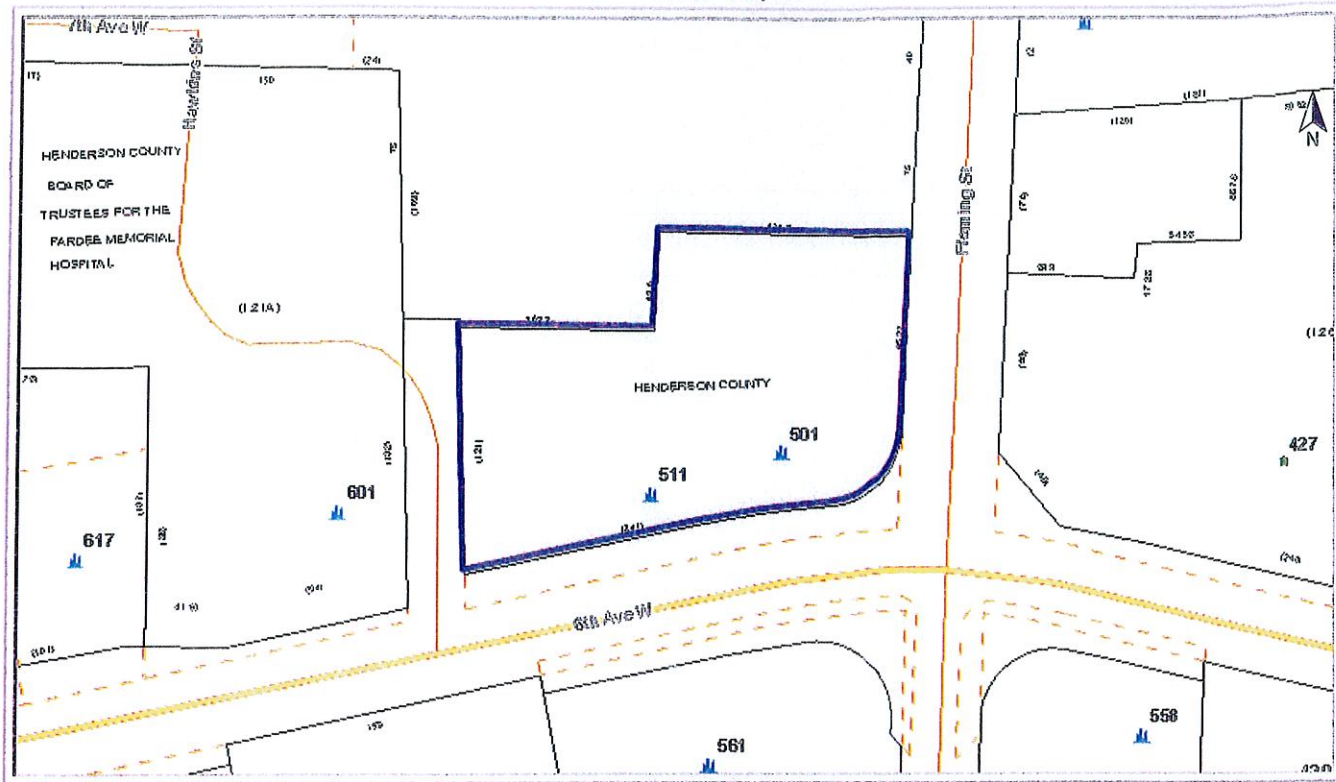
