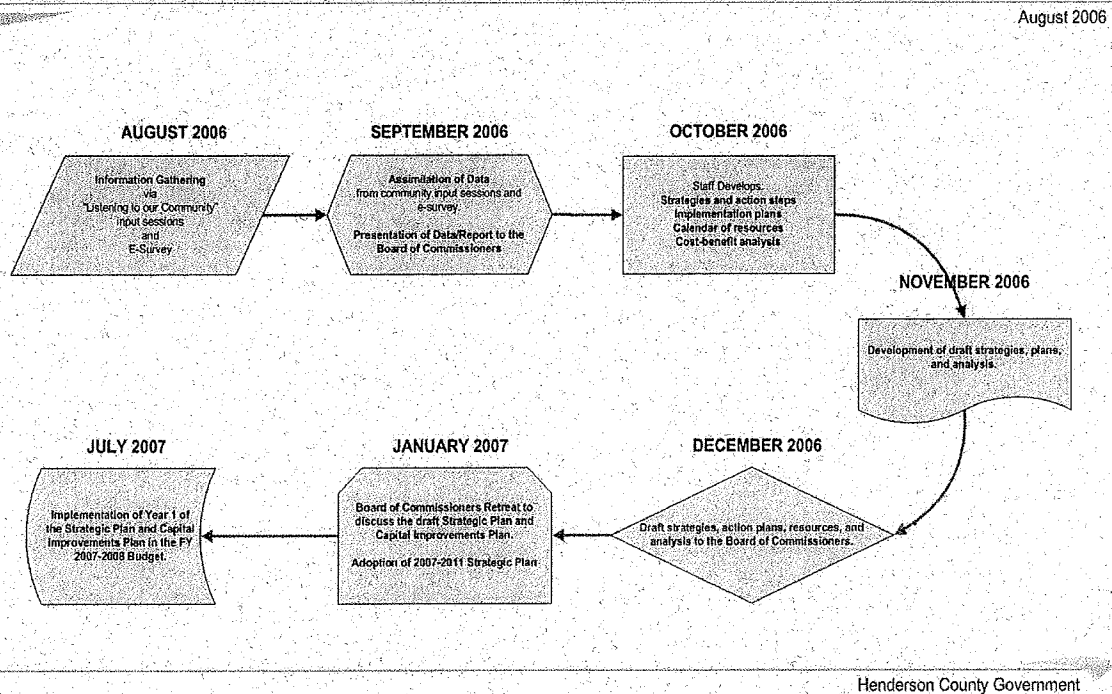

Introduction

In August 2006, Henderson County began its 2007-2011 Strategic Planning process. The initial phase of the process entailed a comprehensive public input process, including four (4) public input sessions and an e-survey process.

The flow chart below illustrates the process for the development of the Strategic Plan:

Listening to our Community Input Sessions

The community input sessions, entitled *Listening to Our Community*, were held on August 1st and 3rd to provide the citizens of the County the opportunity to have input on the development of the 2007-2011 Strategic Plan. The strategic planning process was given substantial media coverage, with press releases sent to all local media outlets and subsequent articles prominently published in the *Times-News*, the *Pisgah Mountain News*, and the *Hendersonville Tribune*. In addition, the input sessions garnered the attention of *WLOS* and announcements of the input sessions were televised on the County's own *HCTV Channel 11*.

As a result of this publicity, and that generated by the Strategic Plan Team members, the County Manager, and the Board of Commissioners, the process received outstanding participation from the community. Approximately 150 citizens attended the input sessions and 71 actively participated by speaking. Some speakers did so on behalf of external organizations, while others spoke simply as concerned citizens.

The following table shows the breakdown of the numbers of speakers per input session:

During these facilitated meetings, the speakers and audience were asked to focus on and answer the following key questions that serve as the foundation for the 2007-2011 Strategic Plan:

1. **What do you feel are Henderson County's most important issues, opportunities, and challenges (strategic issues) for the upcoming four to five years? And why?**
2. **Do you have suggestions (strategies) for how the County should address these strategic issues, opportunities, and challenges?**
3. **North Carolina law provides counties one primary source of revenue to be used to finance its operations – property taxes. In limited instances, counties are permitted to charge fees for services. Given this, how would you propose that Henderson County should finance the initiatives that you have suggested?**

In addition, the speakers were asked to provide any back-up materials necessary to further explain their positions. These back-up materials are available for the Board's review.

E-Survey Process

Simultaneous to the input sessions on August 1, 2006, the County launched an online survey requesting input on the Strategic Plan. The survey was available the entire month of August and focused on the same three questions as those posed for the input sessions. To verify the survey respondent's residence within the County, each respondent was asked to provide their name, address, phone number, and e-mail address. The Team received 391 total responses. Of this total, 61 responses were either incomplete or duplicative. Thus, 330 of the survey responses are being utilized for purposes of developing the Strategic Plan.

Input from Individual County Commissioners and Department Heads

Prior to beginning the input phase of the 2007-2011 Strategic Plan, staff met with individual County Commissioners to gain their responses to the three key questions. In addition, County Department Heads were invited to participate in the process by answering the survey questions. All data gathered from the input sessions, e-survey, departmental surveys, and input from the Board of Commissioners has been assimilated and bound for the Board of Commissioners' review. This document has been provided to the Clerk to the Board and individual Board members may review it at your convenience.

Findings

In reviewing the responses received during the input sessions, online surveys, and responses from County Commissioners and Department Heads, the Team realized that we had a difficult task ahead of us. The attached bulleted list contains the critical elements of the input findings.

The assimilation of this data was difficult because so many of the strategic issues gathered during the input sessions and e-survey overlap each other and are duplicated depending on how the issues are categorized. For instance, the overwhelming majority of input suggested that *growth* is the key issue for Henderson County, but respondents narrowed their responses to reflect growth's impact on various issues, such as its impact on our transportation systems; public schools; public services such as emergency services and law enforcement; jobs; land use planning; etc. To further complicate this, growth was linked to quality of life issues such as recreation opportunities, health care, cultural and performing arts, nuisance abatement, preservation of natural resources, etc. Consequently, the Strategic Plan Team has categorized the issues to the best of its ability. Please note that many of these categories are interrelated and dependent upon each other. In addition, the Team has attempted to classify the issues as having *capital* or *operational* impacts on the County.

Major Categories

The following categories were determined as most encompassing of the issues raised during the month-long input process: ***General Government, Economic Development, Natural Resource Preservation, Human Services, Land-Use Planning, Public Safety, Education, and Cultural and Recreational.*** These categories are explained in more detail as follows:

General Government

Some of the strategic issues proposed during the input sessions were those that were too broad for other categories and fall into the realm of general government. Among them were: *collaboration between government, the private sector, and non-profits for service provision; government accountability; managing illegal immigration; and the need to "keep property taxes low"* were frontrunner issues. Other prominent issues were the need for more *public input opportunities* and the need to *"build community" between native residents and newcomers to the community.*

Economic Development

Among the top issues expressed were those of ensuring that there are *job opportunities* for the County's citizens. Among the comments, were those focused on encouraging "good jobs with good pay" and the need for the County's active involvement in recruiting industry to the community. In addition, some respondents suggested that the *loss of small businesses and agriculture* is having a negative impact on our County's economy.

Natural Resource Preservation

As you may expect, a number of respondents commented about the natural beauty of our community and the need to maintain our *small-town feel* and *historical perspective*. However, some of the most ardent comments made during the input sessions were those that asked for the preservation of our natural resources regarding *water quality* and *recycling* efforts. The need for the development and enforcement of a local Erosion and Sedimentation Control Ordinance was expressed specifically. Additional respondents focused their attention on such issues as *energy management, conservative building practices, or "green building,"* and *sustainable and renewable energy sources*. In addition, a number of respondents commented on the need to preserve the County's *farmland*.

Human Services

Human services is another major category that emerged from the input process. Among the issues, respondents commented on the value of the County's *non-profits* and the need for more advocacy for the County's *aging population, the disabled, and the disadvantaged* in our community. Other input focused on the issues of *improved health care opportunities, advocacy for at-risk children, support for the "working poor," increased childcare subsidy, better mental health services, and the coordination of children and family services*.

Land-Use Planning & Development

As noted earlier, almost all participants in the Strategic Plan input process commented on the impacts of growth on our community. Most of these comments focused on the need to *control or manage growth*, while others expressed their views about the need for *countywide zoning, development restrictions, aesthetic regulations, and "better planning"* in general. Growth meant other things to some, who suggested that the County needs to increase its efforts on *encouraging affordable housing* and specifically *developing an affordable housing trust fund* and the *development and enforcement of a minimum housing code*. Still, there were other respondents that proposed the need for a *countywide sewer system* and the *enforcement of the nuisance ordinance* to help manage the County's growth.

Public Safety

Public safety issues were also raised during the input process. Most of these issues centered on *crime prevention* and the *eradication of illegal drugs* within the community. Other comments addressed the need for improvements to the County's *Emergency Medical Services (EMS)* by increasing staffing, adding vehicles, and developing plans for construction of an EMS headquarters and additional satellite stations, as well as increasing funding and collaboration with the local Rescue Squad. Finally, several respondents identified *animal control issues* as those very important to our County, specifically the need for an *improved spay/neuter program* and the addition of animal control services such as a *volunteer program* and *animal cruelty investigations program*.

Education

A large number of participants in the input process supported increased funding for our public school system. *Schools capital and maintenance needs* were the top priorities among these respondents. Behind that, *increased teacher pay*, the need for *increased instructional funding*, the necessity of *class-size reduction*, and the need for *additional certified and support positions* were key strategic issues noted.

Cultural & Recreational

A large number of participants in the input process voiced their support for increased funding for recreation opportunities. Much of this input focused on the need for *soccer fields*, but a large number of respondents voiced their support for the *additional and improved county parks*, *greenways*, and *biking* opportunities. Several respondents supported the *Tuxedo Park and Library* projects specifically.

Conclusion

The attached overview of issues lists the issues raised during the input phase of the development of the 2007-2011 Strategic Plan. The issues are categorized as described earlier and are classified as capital or operational issues. In some instances, issues may be classified as both capital, and operational issues. The Team did not attempt to rank or prioritize the issues raised during this input phase.

HENDERSON COUNTY N.C. ILLEGAL ALIEN IMMIGRATION RELIEF ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY OF HENDERSON AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. - TITLE

This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Henderson County Illegal Alien Immigration Relief Act Ordinance."

SECTION 2. - FINDINGS AND DECLARATION OF PURPOSE

The People of the County of Henderson find and declare:

- A. That illegal immigration leads to higher crime rates, contributes to overcrowded classrooms and failing schools, subjects our hospitals to fiscal hardship and legal residents to substandard quality of care, contributes to other burdens on public services, increasing their cost and diminishing their availability to lawful residents, and destroys our neighborhoods and diminishes our overall quality of life.
- B. That the County of Henderson is authorized to abate public nuisances and empowered and mandated by the People of Henderson County to abate the nuisance of illegal immigration by diligently prohibiting the acts and policies that facilitate illegal immigration and punishing the people and businesses that aid and abet illegal aliens.
- C. This ordinance seeks to secure to those lawfully present in the United States and this County, whether or not they are Citizens of the United States, the right to live in peace free of the threat of illegal alien crime, to enjoy the public services provided by this County without being burdened by the cost of providing goods, support and services to any whose presence in the United States is contrary to its laws and to be free of the debilitating effects on their economic and social well being imposed by the influx of illegal aliens to the fullest extent that these goals can be achieved consistent with the Constitution and Laws of the United States and the State of North Carolina.

SECTION 3. DEFINITIONS

Whenever used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

"County" means Henderson County, North Carolina .

"Illegal Alien" means any person whose initial entry into the United States was illegal and whose current status is also illegal as well as any person who, after entering legally, has failed to leave the United States upon the expiration of his or her visa.

SECTION 4. BUSINESS PERMITS, CONTRACTS OR GRANTS

Any entity or any parent, affiliate, subsidiary or agent of any entity (other than a charity recognized as exempt from federal income taxation under Sec. 501 of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States and which has obtained and continues to have in force an exemption from federal income taxation), that knowingly employs, retains, aids or abets illegal aliens or illegal immigration into the United States, whether directly or by or through any agent, ruse, guise, device or means, no matter how indirect, and even if the agent or entity might otherwise be exempted from this section, or violates any provision of this Ordinance, shall from the date of the violation or its discovery, whichever shall be later, be denied and barred from approval of a business permit, renewal of a business permit, any county contract or grant as follows:

- (1) For the first violation for a period of five years,
- (2) For any subsequent violation, for a period of ten years.

A. "Aids or abets" includes, but is not limited to:

- (i) hiring of illegal aliens,
- (ii) providing, renting or leasing real property to illegal aliens,

(iii) funding, providing goods and services to or aiding in the establishment or continuation of any day labor center or other entity providing similar services, unless the entity acts with due diligence to verify the legal work status of all persons whom it employs, provides job assistance for or in any way assists or facilitates in obtaining any employment. At a minimum, social security numbers of prospective workers must be verified through the federal Social Security Number computerized verifications system.

B. Except as provided in C., any action or failure to act done within the boundaries of this County that aids and abets illegal aliens or facilitates their avoiding detection and apprehension anywhere in the United States, its territories or possessions violates this Ordinance.

C. This Ordinance shall not be construed to prohibit rendering emergency medical care, emergency assistance or legal assistance.

SECTION 5. RENTING TO ILLEGAL ALIENS

A. Illegal aliens are prohibited from leasing or renting property in the County. Any property owner or renter/tenant/lessee in control of property, who knowingly allows an

illegal alien to use, rent or lease their property shall be in violation of this section.

B. Any person or entity that violates this Section shall be subject to a fine of \$1,000.00.

C. A separate violation of this Section of this Ordinance shall be deemed to have been committed on each day during or on which a violation occurs or continues.

SECTION 6. ENGLISH ONLY

A. The County of Henderson declares that English is the official language of the County.

B. Unless explicitly mandated by the federal government, the state of North Carolina or the County of Henderson, all official County business, forms, documents, signage will be written in English only.

SECTION 7. SEVERABILITY

If any part or provision of this Ordinance is in conflict or inconsistent with applicable provisions of federal or state statutes, or is otherwise held to be invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such part or provision shall be suspended and superseded by such applicable laws or regulations, and the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Any Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

To quote the 17th September HTN editorial, "Henderson County School Board members didn't make a decision Monday night so much as boot the decision to the county commissioners". Enrollment growth is healthy sign

Henderson County School Board members didn't make a decision Monday night so much as boot the decision to the county commissioners. Recommending that commissioners renovate major parts of Mills River Elementary School and build a brand new building, the School Board plopped a \$15 million price tag on the decision makers across town. That's skyrocketing inflation for a project that started out as a \$6 million renovation three years ago, grew to \$10 million, then \$12 million, and now stands at \$15 million. "When we first started talking about Mills River, we were talking about 400 to 450 capacity," School Board member Melissa Maurer said in an interview with the Times-News editorial board last week. "Then we got the crazy high price which the county commissioners understandably balked at. That changed the course of the conversation." Maurer explains that a bigger school with greater capacity became the goal but doesn't explain why commissioners would not "understandably" balk at the new, higher price tag. "None of our planning contemplated \$15 million," says Board of Commissioners chairman Bill Moyer, adding that an outlay that large jeopardizes needed work at Hillandale and Edneyville schools. "This is all going to have to be rethought." A rethinking is in order. It's not at all too soon for the commissioners and School Board to have a serious discussion of long-range school building needs, one that would dovetail with the 12-year countywide capital plan that County Manager Steve Wyatt wants to craft. As Maurer said last week, the stress on Mills River and other schools is a good preview of coming attractions. "The word growth covers it all," she said. "Our 10-day (enrollment) number compared to last year is 375 more children."

What's puzzling about the debate is how gloomy we are about enrollment growth. School Board candidate Dick Baird sees the county's growth and is filled with dread. "If we continue to grow, we're going to have to build a new elementary school every two years," he said at a candidates forum Thursday night. "It's looking bleak." The Dick Bairds of the world have no idea how many small towns and counties in North Carolina -- or in North Dakota or South Georgia -- would love to have our "bleak" future: more young families moving in, an appealing quality of life based in no small part on good schools, booming home construction, a strong tax base. If the Mills River project shocks the conscience, wait till we see the long-range needs. "Our high schools are full. Our middle schools are full," Maurer said. The Mills River, Hillandale and Edneyville projects are in the near-term plans. Not too far down the road are new classrooms at Apple Valley and North Henderson. After that, a \$42 million high school and a \$25 million middle school. The Henderson County habit has been to make a tough decision, then dive into the bunker and hope we won't have to raise the money for anything else. It always puts us behind. In schools, it dooms us to a treadmill of trailers. Yes, school houses cost money. Taxes will go up. We ought to do all we can to find efficiencies. We may have to build bigger schools than we're comfortable with, and think of innovative ways to cluster two or three schools on a campus to save money on land and on expensive gyms and stadiums and running tracks. If we make the easier choice instead to cram more children in the classrooms we have, we'll end up with discouraged and overwhelmed teachers, infuriated parents and children left behind (where have we heard that?). Quality public education in decent buildings is not just the right thing to do for our children; it's the right thing to do for our economic future. Enrollment growth that requires new schools is not a drain on our prosperity. It is one of the factors driving our prosperity.

What does the Surgeon General say about second hand smoke?

“The health effects of secondhand smoke exposure are more pervasive than we previously thought,” said **Surgeon General Carmona**, vice admiral of the U.S. Public Health Service. “The scientific evidence is now indisputable: secondhand smoke is not a mere annoyance. It is a serious health hazard that can lead to disease and premature death in children and nonsmoking adults.” Secondhand smoke contains more than 50 cancer-causing chemicals, and is itself a known human carcinogen. Nonsmokers who are exposed to secondhand smoke inhale many of the same toxins as smokers. Even brief exposure to secondhand smoke has immediate adverse effects on the cardiovascular system and increases risk for heart disease and lung cancer, the report says. In addition, the report notes that because the bodies of infants and children are still developing, they are especially vulnerable to the poisons in secondhand smoke.

Excerpt from the Tuesday, June 27, 2006 press release from the US Department of Health and Human Services regarding the recent study published by the Surgeon General entitled, “The health consequences of involuntary exposure to tobacco smoke.”

What is Second Hand Smoke (otherwise known as Environmental Tobacco Smoke (ETS))?

According to the **American Lung Association** Second Hand Smoke can be defined as follows: “Secondhand smoke, also known as environmental tobacco smoke (ETS), is a mixture of the smoke given off by the burning end of a cigarette, pipe or cigar and the smoke exhaled from the lungs of smokers. It is involuntarily inhaled by nonsmokers, lingers in the air hours after cigarettes have been extinguished and can cause or exacerbate a wide range of adverse health effects, including cancer, respiratory infections, and asthma.”

What are the risks of exposure to second hand smoke?

According to the **American Lung Association**, the following “fact sheet” details some of the health risks caused by exposure to second hand smoke.

- Secondhand smoke has been classified by the **Environmental Protection Agency** (EPA) as a known cause of cancer in humans (Group A carcinogen).²
- Secondhand smoke exposure causes disease and premature death in children and adults who do not smoke. Secondhand smoke contains hundreds of chemicals known to be toxic or carcinogenic, including formaldehyde, benzene, vinyl chloride, arsenic ammonia and hydrogen cyanide.³
- Secondhand smoke causes approximately 3,400 lung cancer deaths and 22,700-69,600 heart disease deaths in adult nonsmokers in the United States each year.⁴
- A study found that nonsmokers exposed to environmental smoke were 25 percent more likely to have coronary heart diseases compared to nonsmokers not exposed to smoke.⁵

- Nonsmokers exposed to secondhand smoke at work are at increased risk for adverse health effects. Levels of ETS in restaurants and bars were found to be 2 to 5 times higher than in residences with smokers and 2 to 6 times higher than in office workplaces.⁶
- Secondhand smoke is especially harmful to young children. Secondhand smoke is responsible for between 150,000 and 300,000 lower respiratory tract infections in infants and children under 18 months of age, resulting in between 7,500 and 15,000 hospitalizations each year, and causes 1,900 to 2,700 sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) deaths in the United States annually.¹¹
- Secondhand smoke exposure may cause buildup of fluid in the middle ear, resulting in 700,000 to 1.6 million physician office visits per year.¹² Secondhand smoke can also aggravate symptoms in 400,000 to 1,000,000 children with asthma.¹³
- The current **Surgeon General's Report** concluded that scientific evidence indicates that there is no risk-free level of exposure to second hand smoke. Short exposures to second hand smoke can cause blood platelets to become stickier, damage the lining of blood vessels, decrease coronary flow velocity reserves, and reduce heart rate variability, potentially increasing the risk of heart attack.¹⁷

What are the effects of second hand smoke on Pregnant Women and their unborn children?

According to the **Surgeon General's** recent report entitled, "The health consequences of involuntary exposure to tobacco smoke" one of the effects of second hand smoke on pregnant women is an increased likelihood of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). The study also links exposure to second hand smoke to low birth weight and preterm delivery.

The **Ministry of Health** in British Columbia concludes, "Pregnant women exposed to second-hand smoke can have a greater risk of miscarriages and babies with low birth weight."

According to the **Cleveland Clinic** pregnant women are among those at the greatest risk for being harmed by second hand smoke. The smoke harms the mother as well as the unborn child. It increases both mother and baby's risk of developing lung cancer, heart disease, emphysema, allergies, asthma, and other health problems.

Can Non-smokers be protected by the designation of smoking and non-smoking areas inside buildings?

The **Surgeon General** Richard Carmona doesn't think so. In a press release on June 27, 2006 he says, "The good news is that, unlike some public health hazards, secondhand smoke exposure is easily prevented. Smoke-free indoor environments are proven, simple approaches that prevent exposure and harm." The report finds that even the most

sophisticated ventilation systems cannot completely eliminate secondhand smoke exposure and that only smoke-free environments afford full protection.

The **Washington State Department of Health** writes the following on their web site concerning second hand smoke:

“It is important to remember that opening a window, smoking in another room, or having air purifiers and ventilation systems won’t protect your family from secondhand smoke. Smoke can creep underneath closed doors and locked windows and invade other areas of your home. Even after a cigarette, cigar, or pipe has been put out, highly toxic secondhand smoke remains in the environment (clothes, carpets, drapes, air) and circulates all over the house. Another thing to remember is that secondhand smoke is more concentrated and has higher levels of toxins when it exists in small spaces such as a single room or car. Protect the people living with you from these toxins by smoking outside.”

Some facts specific to the situation in the Henderson County Courthouse:

- The Henderson County Commissioners Building and the State Legislatures Building are both smoke free, yet those two entities stand in the way of my workplace being smoke-free
- Every other courthouse in our five county district is smoke free.
- There are 3 cancer survivors that work in that area and their interests are protected by federal law.
- There are two pregnant women and several asthmatics that must work in the area of the upstairs smoking lounge.
- There are constant daily complaints from courthouse personnel, officers, lawyers and staff.
- The conference room directly across from the smoking lounge is used to conduct juvenile hearings thus exposing children to second hand smoke.

What can our local government do to protect us?

Although North Carolina law is behind the national standard as far as protecting its citizens in the workplace, there are things that local governments can do. According to Attorney Anne Dellinger, who did a comprehensive review of North Carolina’s laws regarding ETS regulations, there are things local governments can do to protect the health of their constituents. Dellinger writes:

“Commissioners and council members retain some authority and may need to use it to avoid claims of workers’ compensation, unemployment benefits, violations of handicapped protection statutes and Constitutional violations. State law allows local officials to designate as smoke free up to 80% of public space. This percentage is higher in certain sites such as health departments. Federal statutes protect people disabled by

smoking or secondhand smoke and preempt state law if the two conflict. People being detained have the right to a minimally healthy environment guaranteed by the Eighth Amendment of the United States Constitution.”

The Solution:

Dellinger also notes the limitations of the current NC law on indoor smoking and discusses policy options that local governments can legally adopt to protect their citizens. State buildings are required to set aside 20% of the interior space for smoking areas, unless such a rule is “physically impracticable.” She goes on to point out that some state controlled buildings have deemed the 20% rule “impracticable because the space is too small or the ventilation systems are not adequate to protect the health of non-smokers. They have subsequently adopted 100% Environmental Tobacco smoke-free policies.”

Conclusion:

The first study by the Surgeon General on this topic was in 1972 which concluded that there were significant health risks to non-smokers exposed to second hand smoke. A more compelling and conclusive study was done in 1986 and now 20 years later the Surgeon General is telling us what we should have known for years; second hand smoke kills. I do not have 20 or 30 years to wait for changes to come around. Change must occur now to protect me and my unborn child as well as dozens of other individuals I share a courtroom and office with on a daily basis. You have the power to change the current designation and I am asking you to use that power to protect the health of the people of Henderson County.

According to the Canadian Cancer society, there are some **4000 chemicals** in second hand smoke, and as the **Surgeon General** says, **50 of them are cancerous**.

The **chemicals** listed below are contained in second hand smoke and are also on the list of chemicals that **OSHA** indicates may not be present in the workplace in certain concentrations:

If even one of these chemicals is found in greater concentration than OSHA standards allow then Henderson County is in violation of Federal and State law and thus susceptible to litigation.



I am Assistant District Attorney Kathleen Brown-Blake and I work in the Henderson County District Attorney's office. Our office, the negotiations room and the courtroom for District Court in Henderson County are all next to a room dubbed "the smoking room" in the Henderson County Courthouse. This room has no ventilation, the windows do not open and, thus, the smoke seeps out of that room into the hall, the room where I negotiate with attorneys every day, into our office and even into the courtroom. This courthouse is supposed to be a smoke free environment and for those of us who spend eight or more hours a day working in this part of the courthouse, the exposure to second hand smoke is intolerable. The dangers to our health greatly outweigh the pleasure some of the attorneys get from smoking inside the building.

The smoke has caused some of my colleagues migraines, and one of the clerks that works in District Court just spent the full term of her nine months pregnant breathing in those toxic fumes. This second hand smoke can cause countless conditions in a newborn child ranging from asthma to growth disorders. For the rest of us, the constant headaches and sinus infections as well as the increased risk of cancer is not acceptable. Henderson County Courthouse was designated a smoke free building and it must be maintained as such for those of us who do not have the ability to leave the building and go back to our offices outside the courthouse and for those who choose not to smoke. Please take this into account when deciding whether to remove the smoking room from the second floor of the courthouse. Thank you for your time and consideration.

This issue was brought up by many people in reference to the break room on the ground floor also. Many who are not smokers must also endure heavy smoke in able to use the snack and drink machines. Also the ATM machine is in that room and the same issue applies.

To sum this up, I would like to have the issue of smoking in my work place addressed. I have to be here, and I do not appreciate the fact that I have to breathe and wear someone else's smoke.

But for my work schedule, I would be there in person to address an issue that is of great concern to me. That issue, although it seems minor, is that of the location of the "smoking room" on the 2nd floor of the Henderson County Courthouse.

The location of the smoking room could not be worse. It is next to the district attorney's office, across from both the court staff entrance to the district courtroom and the attorney corp. room. Upon stepping off the elevator/stairwell, the smell of smoke is ALWAYS noticeable, even if there is nobody actually smoking. The smell can become so bad that it permeates into the courtroom. In addition, the smoke is often so thick it is visable in the hallway outside the room. As I stated there is no way at all a non-smoker or person with health concerns could possibly avoid this as it is the hallway in the common area, to get to the bathroom, water fountain, DA's office or atty. corp. room, you must use this hallway. To get a cup of coffee, tea, etc or use a phone you must actually go in this room. To have the only staff breakroom as the smoking room is making it unusable for a majority of staff.

There are maybe 4-6 smokers in the mix of about 50 plus people involved in the personnel of running court, attorneys, officers, probation officers, clerks. We have to be here, smoking is an option, a choice. How can an option for a few be more important than the healthy work environment of the balance.

Many with allergies & asthma have chronic problems when passing by ~~the~~ the closed door of this room. May I also point out there is a smoking room designated as such on the ground floor.

The County building you all work in is smoke free. I am not asking for that; I am asking that the smoking room not be such that it forces us to breathe second hand smoke; have our clothes & hair smell and suffer from aggravated allergies because of a smoking room that could not be in a worse location if they tried.

Please take whatever steps necessary to immediately make the break room ^{non-smoking} ~~on the 2nd floor~~ and if there is not a viable option, the ground floor smoking room is available to all.

I am writing to express my concerns over the designated smoking areas in the courthouse. It is my understanding that the courthouse began as a smoke free environment and someone complained because they could not smoke inside the building. Once that complaint was filed, it was resolved by punishing everyone who enters the building. This was accomplished when the primary smoking area was located in the only public break room in the building: near the elevators on the ground floor. If one needs to use the public telephone he /she must suffocate thru the smoke to get to the phone. If one needs a snack or drink, again they must suffocate thru the smoke to get whatever they choose from the vending machines located,... you guessed it, in the smoking area. Just waiting to get on the elevator can take your breath away.

The second designated area concerns me more because I don't require the public phone, nor snacks or drinks from the machines. I am not required to be in the break room on the ground floor except on occasion. However, I am required to suffocate thru the dense fog of secondhand smoke located on the second floor in the 'employees only' hallway where all the courthouse employee smokers gather to smoke. The room is very small, and located just outside the criminal district courtroom where I am required to be everyday. I must travel this hallway and tread thru the smoke on a daily basis, several times a day. I have very bad physical reactions to this smoke including but not limited to breathing problems, sinus irritation, eye irritation, sore throat and headache.

I used to smoke many years ago and given that fact, I must say, I was always courteous to those who did not choose to partake in my bad habit. I smoked outside any building, before there were smoking areas and before non-smokers had sued for breathing rights. But I soon got smart and quit the nasty, cancer causing habit that was taking my life.

If the county commissioners can insist on and obtain a smoke free environment, why can't the courthouse be smoke free as well? At the very least, why are non-smokers being forced to breathe the nasty, cancer causing second hand smoke of those who choose to partake? Is your health more important than the general public? Or mine?

If you insist on designating a smoking area in the courthouse, the very least you could do is locate it somewhere the rest of us who are trying to maintain good health wouldn't have to suffer everyday. Thank you for your time.

Dear David:

Recently I asked my Administrative Assistant, Jennie McDonald, to attend in my stead a meeting you conducted involving cigarette smoking and the ventilation system in the courthouse. Jennie has reported (by way of informing and not complaining) that often cigarette smoke in substantial amounts is escaping the lawyers' lounge on the second floor and being disseminated throughout that floor apparently through the vent system. Clearly the Henderson County taxpayers have provided us with a world class court facility and we wondered if the vent system was malfunctioning, or something else was exacerbating the situation.

During the meeting, apparently the question arose of the County Board of Commissioners enacting a no smoking ordinance for all, or parts of the courthouse. In response to an additional question raised at that meeting, let me reiterate that even though it is often difficult for us to obtain fully up-to-date volumes of the various county and city ordinances in effect at any given time, in relevant and appropriate circumstances my office has occasion to prosecute ordinance violations wherein the violations thereof are specifically misdemeanors.


Just like all District Attorneys' offices in North Carolina, we recognize that each violation of criminal statute or ordinance is an individual situation with unique circumstances, and we therefore handle each such violation on a case by case basis. Keeping in mind that each instance stands or falls on its own merits, my office, as always, stands ready to prosecute ordinance violations in appropriate, relevant situations whether they relate to cigarette smoking in public buildings, or to other issues.

Speaking on behalf of the Statonwoods Homeowners Association, the Executive Committee has prepared the following objections and questions to the proposed rezoning of the 5.91 acres off NC 225 Greenville Highway:

We find it difficult to understand how 5 of the 6 members of the Planning Board recommended approval of this application, knowing that it violates the US 25 Corridor Study accepted by the Board of Commissions on January 7, 2002, which recommends that the area south of Erkwood Drive/Shepherd Street is "best suited for light to medium density residential purposes," (6.2.1.1) and that the study "support(s) the current R-20 zoning on the Subject Area." (6.2.1.2)

Between 2002 and 2004, according to Table 5.A, there was a consistent increase in the annual average daily traffic count on NC 225 in the area in question, actually a 14.35% increase in two years. At least three higher density developments have been added since then, two of which are North of the subject area and one South, and now a fourth is being considered. What impact has this had on NC 225, and how close are we now to exceeding the safe capacity of NC 225? A parcel already exists zoned R-A near Wistoria Place, which can additionally increase traffic.

What kind of impact study is being done regarding the Highland Lake Rd/Upward Rd connector to I-26, and how will these additional high density developments impact that? Your own traffic study conducted from 2002 to 2004 shows most of the traffic going to I-26 is using NC 225 instead of 176, as 176 has remained constant during this time period.

In the past two weeks 3 families that we *know* of in our development experienced severe delays on Highland Lake Rd/Upward Rd while trying to get to serious medical appointments.

Our concern is that R-10 zoning would allow 4 units per acre. A Special Use Permit, about which we would have no say, could further increase the number of houses per acre to up to 8 houses per acre, a total of 48 families with a potential of 96 additional cars per day on 225.

The subject property is on the market with Beverly-Hanks, Realtor, with advertising that says it "can be rezoned" (not "may" be). Have you committed R-10 zoning of this property to Beverly-Hanks? What ramifications could occur if a totally different owner takes possession of the property -- such as a Special Use Permit, for example? Shouldn't the applicants, who apparently purchased the property on speculation, provide proof of intent?
