2023.122 Budget Amendment – Fund Balance Appropriation

Staff requested the Board approve a budget amendment, which appropriates fund balance for purchases that will not be fulfilled until FY24. These items, included on the list provided, were approved, budgeted for, and encumbered in FY23 but were not delivered or fulfilled by the end of the fiscal year because of supply chain disruptions or other delays. Motion:

2023.123 Budget Amendment - Federal Forfeiture Fund

Staff requested the Board approve a budget amendment which appropriates Federal Forfeiture Funds for a purchase of Covert Trackers. The purchase of the Covert Trackers was approved by the Board in FY23 but was not completed until FY2024.

Motion:

I move the Board approve the budget amendment to appropriate Federal Forfeiture Funds.

2023.124 Budget Amendment - Restricted Fund Balance Sheriff's Office

Sheriff's Office Staff has requested the Board approve a budget amendment that appropriates fund balance for unused restricted donations for Sheriff's Office special funds. These funds are derived from restricted donations to be used for specific programs, including Pawnbroker, K-9, VIP, STAR, Shop with a Hero, and Honor Guard. The amounts reflected in the budget amendment are the unspent portion of restricted donations from FY2023, to be carried over and spent in FY2024.

2023.125 Budget Amendment - MRTS

The Board was requested to approve a budget amendment appropriating fund balance from Maintenance, Repair, Technology, and Security (MRTS) for both the Henderson County Public Schools and Blue Ridge Community College. This budget amendment will appropriate funds sufficient for FY24 projects and projects that were budgeted in FY23 but not completed by the close of the fiscal year.

Motion:

I move the Board approve the budget amendment as presented.

Agreement with James R. Vannoy and Sons Construction, Inc. Solid Waste: Third Transfer Station Bay

During the August 3, 2023, meeting, the Board selected James R. Vannoy and Sons Construction, Inc (Vannoy) as the most qualified responding Construction Manager at Risk firm for the subject project. In turn, staff has negotiated a proposed agreement with Vannoy for \$37,875 for the Board's consideration. This proposed amount is 0.45% of the estimated construction cost and is consistent with previous agreements with Vannoy and other CMR firms.

Should the Board approve the proposal, staff will generate an AIA contract consistent with the previous CMR contracts.

Motion:

I move that the Board authorize the County Engineer to develop and execute a CMR contract with James R. Vannoy and Sons Construction, Inc. based on their proposal of \$37,875.

Temporary Project Position – Site Development

The Board was requested to approve the addition of a temporary project position in the Site Development Department, effective September 10, 2023, through December 31, 2023. The addition of the position will provide the Department with the capacity to allow for Stormwater/Watershed and Floodplain training requirements.

Motion:

I move the Board approve the temporary project position, effective September 10, 2023, through December 31, 2023.

Rejection of Bids for the Purchase of 42 Computers with Accessories

The Board was requested to reject all bids and authorize staff to resolicit bids.

Due to the purchase involving the use of federal funds, bids were solicited from August 3 to August 15. The low bids received within budget were as follows: Archangel Education Technology in the amount of \$74,330.80, Riverside Technologies in the amount of \$86,851, and Y&S Technologies in the amount of \$114,036. These bids were within budget; however, they did not conform to the specifications provided. All other bids received were above the budgeted amount of \$132,950 that was budgeted in the Department of Social Services and Department of Public Health budgets for FY2024.

Motion:

I move the Board reject all bids and authorize staff to proceed with rebidding the purchase of computer workstations and peripherals.

Home & Community Care Block Grant – FY24 Funding Provider Packets

At the Board meeting held on June 5, 2023, the FY24 County funding plan for the Home & Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) was approved. Following approval of the funding plan, area Providers were required to submit completed application packets for remission to Land of Sky (LOS), the Area Agency on Aging for County-Based Aging Services.

Motion:

I move the Board authorize the Chairman to sign off on the HCCBG County Funding Plan County Services Summary and the County Funding Plan Provider Services Summaries as presented.

Facility Use Policy Exemption – Camera Club of Hendersonville

The County has received a request from the Camera Club of Hendersonville to display members' prints from their annual print competition at the Library's main branch in Hendersonville during October 2023.

To allow for this use on County grounds, the Board was requested to grant a one-time exemption to the Public Library Facility Use Policy. This exemption, if granted, would cover only the month of October 2023, as outlined above.

Motion:

I move that the Board grant an exemption to the Public Library Facility Use Policy, allowing the Camera Club of Hendersonville to utilize the Library to display members' prints during the month of October 2023.

2023.126 Strategic Plan Adoption – For the use of Opioid Settlement Funds

At the Board's August 16, 2023 meeting, Katie Varnadoe, Director of Consulting Services with The REAL Academy, presented the Board with a proposed Strategic Plan for the use of Opioid Settlement Funds. This proposed draft was subsequently posted on the County's website for further review by any interested parties.

Following that review period, the Board was requested to formally adopt the Strategic Plan as presented. This adoption allows the County to "unlock" all potential uses for the Opioid Settlement Funds.

Motion:

I move the Board approve the "Strategic Plan for the Use of Opioid Settlement Funding FY2023-2028" as presented.

Henderson County Historic Resource Landmark Designation Application – Samuel J. Childs House

On April 15, 2015, the Board of Commissioners adopted the Historic Resources Landmark Ordinance and associated design guidelines. Although the program participation is voluntary, properties must meet certain criteria to be selected through a quasi-judicial hearing by the Zoning Board of Adjustment and be approved by the Board of Commissioners. By law, the adoption of this ordinance will allow the portions of properties approved for historic designation to be eligible for a 50% tax abatement.

The Henderson County Historic Resources Commission (HRC) recommends that the Samuel J. Childs House, located at 105 Turley Falls Rd., be designated as a Local Landmark based on the information presented in the Local Landmark Designation application. The HRC has completed reports on the historic, architectural, and cultural significance of the church sanctuary building and has determined that it is worthy of Local Landmark designation. The State Historic Preservation Office has also reviewed the application for conformance.

On July 26, 2023, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, through a quasi-judicial proceeding, voted to approve the exterior of the principal structure, Samuel J. Childs House, not including accessory structures or amenities on the grounds, located at 105 Turley Falls Rd as a Local Landmark Designation.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment reviewed the draft order during their August 30, 2023, meeting. The order must be forwarded to the Board of Commissioners for approval and eligibility for a tax abatement.

Motion:

I move that the Board approve the exterior of the principal structure, Samuel J. Childs House, not including accessory structures or amenities on the grounds, located at 105 Turley Falls Road (S.R. 1215) as a Local Landmark Designation.

2023.127 Conditions for Rezoning R-2023-07-C

This is the conditional rezoning matter heard by the Board on July 19, 2023.

The conditions provided have been approved by the applicant and are consistent with the Board's statements at the hearing. Condition 1 is an attempt to give specificity to the Board's statements in the event the City of Hendersonville refuses sewer connection in the absence of a request for annexation by the property owner.

Motion:

I move that the Board approve the statement of conditions for the rezoning R-2023-07-C.

Commissioner Lapsley made the motion to adopt the consent agenda as presented. All voted in favor, and the motion carried.

PUBLIC HEARING

Commissioner Andreotta made the motion to go into the Public Hearing. All voted in favor, and the motion carried.

2023.128 Project Eagle – Application for Economic Development Incentives

A public hearing was held at the request of "Project Eagle Corporation" for proposed economic development incentives.

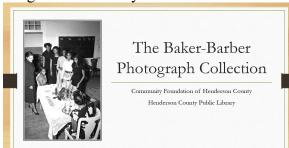

Baker Barber Collection Update

Library Director Trina Rushing provided the Board with an update on the digitization of the Baker Barber Collection. Reference/Special Collections Librarian Mark Burdette answered questions from the Board. He explained the method for uploading and cataloging the collection's 40,000 images to the County's website.









The Board directed Staff to upload the Baker Barber collection in its entirety to the County's website and to continue to work on the cataloging and organization of the project to create a searchable index. Staff was further directed to develop a timeline and proposed cost for completing the Baker Barber Collection within the next five years.

2045 Comprehensive Plan – Map Update

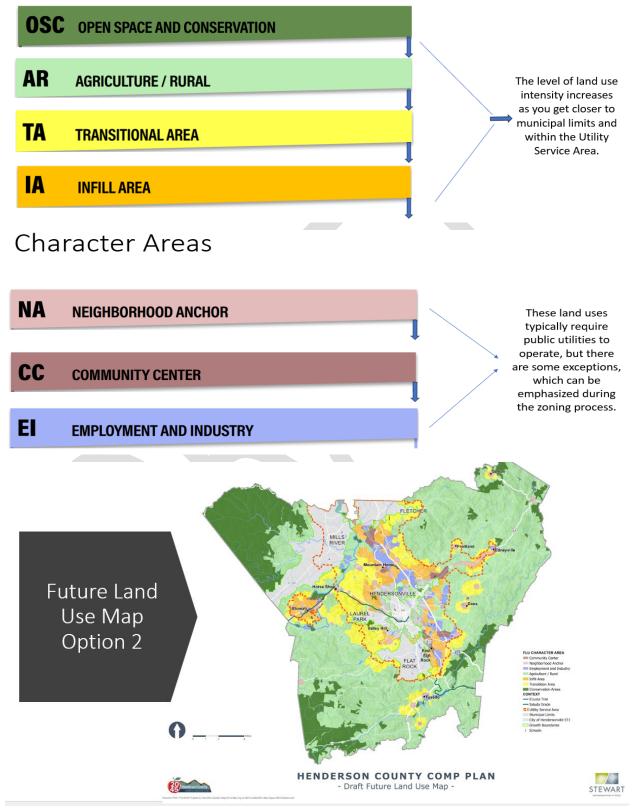
After receipt of the draft 2045 Comprehensive Plan from the Planning Board on December 5th, 2022, the Board of Commissioners has been conducting a thorough review of the draft plan. As part of that process, the Board of Commissioners wished to review the Future Land Use Map.

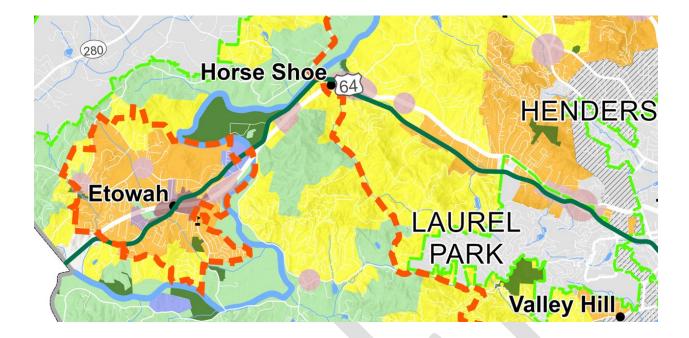
The Board of Commissioners directed staff at their meeting on August 16th, 2023, to break down the current draft map into smaller geographic areas for review.

Future Land Use Map

- Legally required and is the backbone of the comprehensive plan.
- Has seven Character Areas that cover the whole County aside from municipal limits and ETJ areas.
- Is NOT the same as a zoning map since it's high-level and envisions land use 20 years in the future.
 - FLUM should inform rezoning decisions along with an in-depth analysis and public feedback
 - Character Areas could represent multiple different zoning districts
- Agriculture is exempt from County zoning and can be practiced in any of the Character Areas.

The Board began the discussion with the Etowah region of the county.

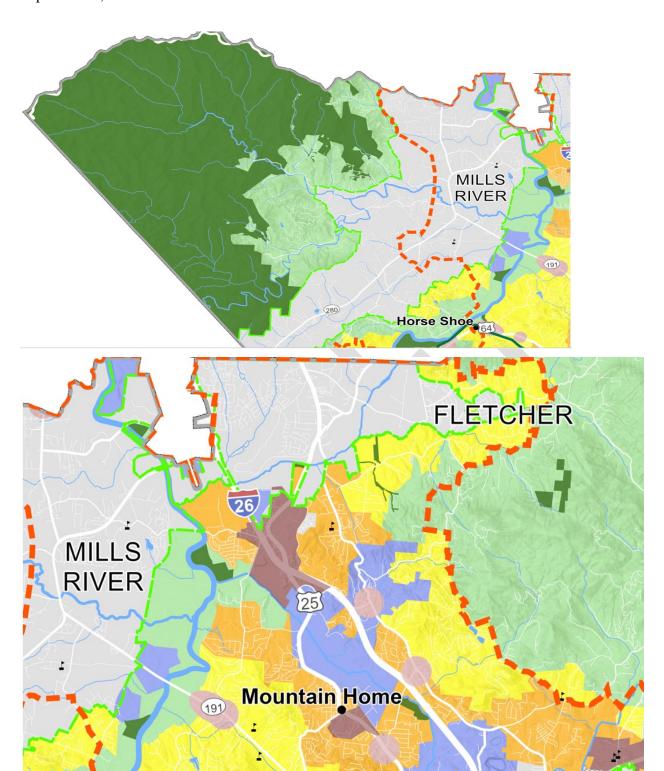
Commissioner Lapsley noted that the Future Land Use Map is a visionary document, not a regulatory document.

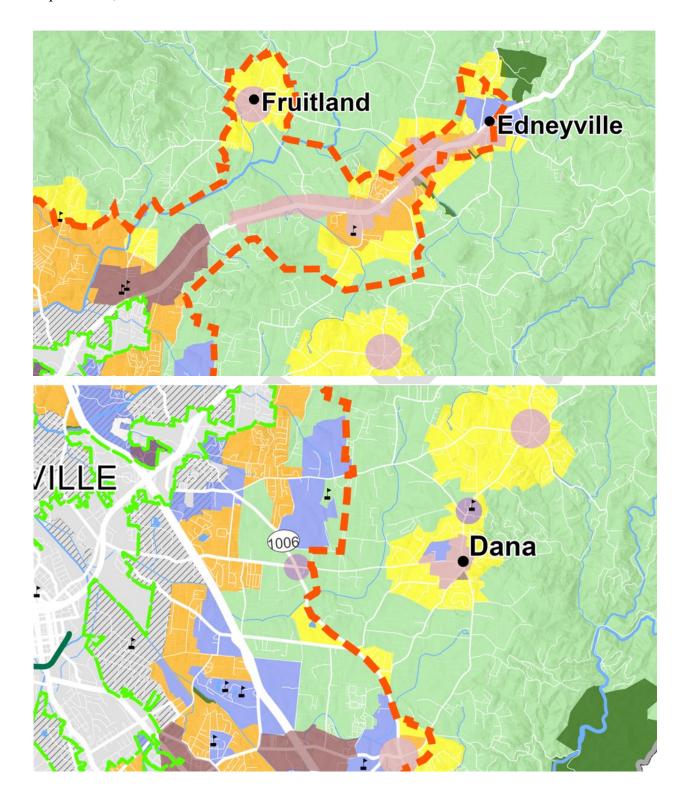
Commissioner Lapsley asked to revisit the density range for the yellow and orange shaded areas of the proposed map and asked for the proposed density for each of those areas. Mr. Todd said the yellow-shaded areas would have a maximum of 2-4 units per acre and the orange areas a maximum of 8-12 units per acre.

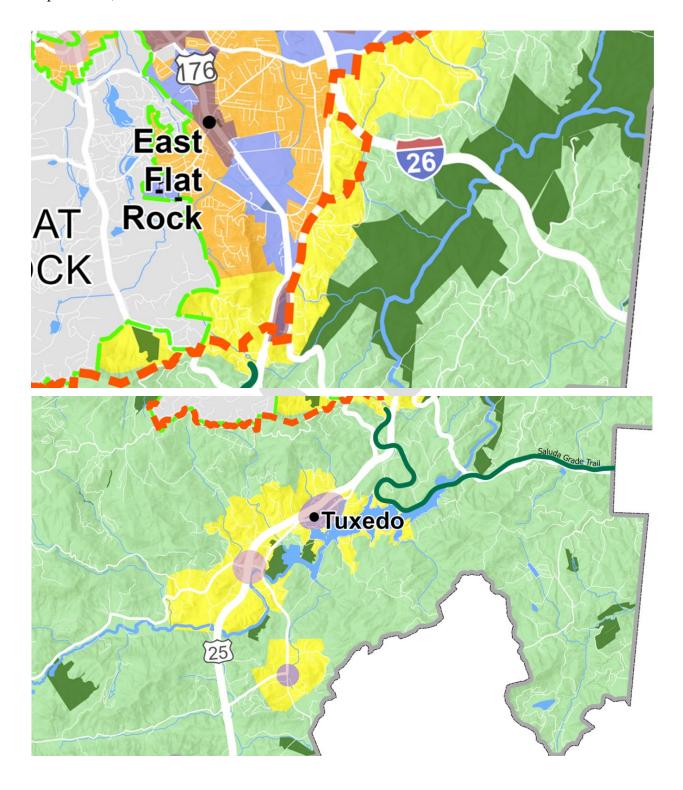
Commissioner Hill proposed that the orange be left along the US64 Corridor and yellow for outlying areas.

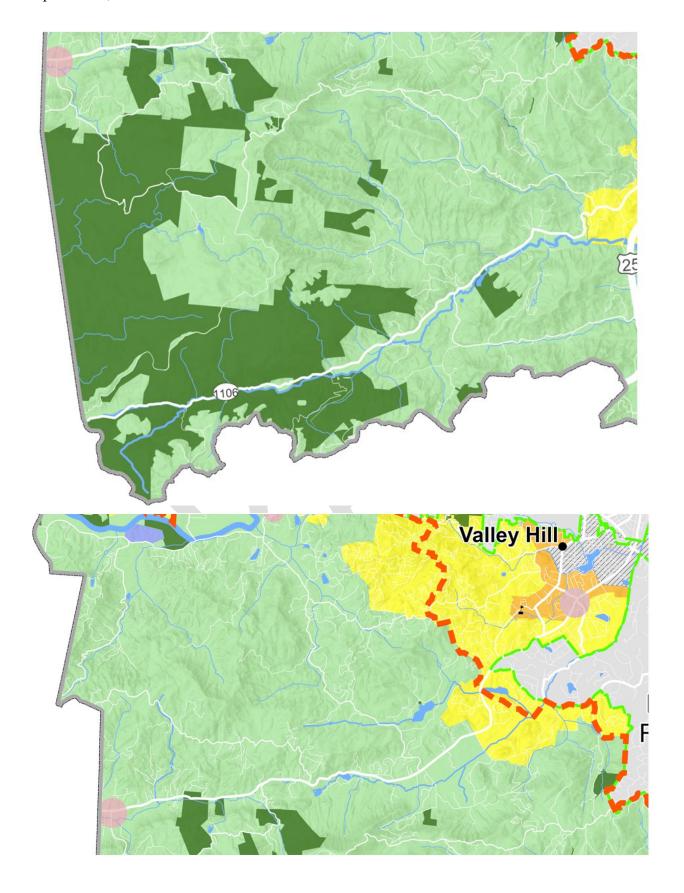
Chris Todd said the County had achieved almost all goals outlined in the 2020 Comprehensive Plan adopted in 2004.

Commissioner Lapsley proposed that the Board members review each of the proposed maps and come back with their recommendations individually.









After discussion, Chairman McCall directed Staff to provide blank maps that show municipality boundaries and water and sewer availability for the Board to review and indicate what uses they would support for future Land Use Maps.

Vice-Chair Edney asked that Staff work on the verbiage used regarding the density of each of the areas. He wants the proposed uses to be clear and not focused on the maximum density.

John Mitchell said this item would be added to the Board's agenda for their mid-month meeting.
