2025.157 Resolution - We are Hope Week

The Board of Commissioners was requested to adopt a resolution, designating September 22-26, 2025, as "We Are Hope" Week in Henderson County Public Schools' middle and high schools.

RESOLUTION – HONORING THE OBSERVANCE OF "WE ARE HOPE" WEEK IN HENDERSON COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS' MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOLS

- WHEREAS, Substance and alcohol misuse adversely affect the brain, liver, heart, and overall health and can cause adverse behavioral, psychological, social, and fatal consequences; and
- WHEREAS, there were more than 83,300 drug overdose deaths in the United States in 2024, and the overall trend since 2018 is marked by a sharp rise, driven largely by synthetic opioids like fentanyl; and
- WHEREAS, substance and alcohol abuse continue to occur among children and youth in our society: with overall usage among youth declining during the last 10 years due to education and prevention efforts; and

WHEREAS, student leaders in Henderson County Public Schools' six high schools and four middle schools have joined with local Henderson County Hope Coalition in educating their peers on alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, and prescription drug use and misuse; and

- WHEREAS, students at Apple Valley Middle, Flat Rock Middle, Hendersonville Middle, Rugby Middle, East Henderson High, Innovative High School, Henderson County Career Academy, Hendersonville High, North Henderson High, and West Henderson High are pledging to be and remain substance-free.
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Henderson County Board of Commissioners, that September 22nd, 2025 September 26th, 2025, be observed in Henderson County Public Schools' middle and high schools as "We Are Hope" substance abuse prevention week.

- WHEREAS, On September 10, 2025, Charles James Kirk ("Charlie Kirk") was publicly assassinated at Utah Valley University while speaking at an event; and
- WHEREAS, Charlie Kirk built his mission on the cornerstone of the belief that political discourse is best when it is open, civil, and rooted in the First Amendment; and
- WHEREAS, Charlie Kirk was dedicated to fostering an environment for open debate and dialogue on some of the toughest issues facing American politics; and
- **WHEREAS,** The Henderson County Board of Commissioners proudly uphold the First Amendment and believes that exercising that right should come without risk of death or injury; and
- **WHEREAS,** The United States of America was founded upon the universal truths that men are endowed with certain unalienable rights, among which are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Charles James Kirk will be remembered for his dedication to pursuing open dialogue in a world of polarized politics. The Board of Commissioners reaffirms its commitment to the First Amendment and the rights of all Americans to peacefully assemble and to express their political views and opinions without fear of violence.



2025.158 Grant - NC Arts Council Grassroots Program

A grant contract and related budget amendment for the North Carolina Arts Council's Grassroots Art Program were presented for the Board's review and approval. Henderson County is acting as a pass-through entity for these funds, totaling \$80,837. With the Board's approval, Henderson County will accept the grant funds from the North Carolina Arts Council, serve as a member on the awardee selection committee, draft grant contracts for each awardee, and disburse all grant funds to the organizations selected by the committee. The Grant Administrator will ensure that subgrantees meet the North Carolina Arts Council's reporting requirements and submit the grant's final report.

Motion: I move that the Board of Commissioners approve the grant contract with the North Carolina Arts Council for the Grassroots Art Program and the associated budget amendment as presented.

Architect of Record Proposal – Medical Office Building, Mills River

The Board was requested to approve a proposal letter from LS3P Architects for design services, including Design Development through Construction Administration Phase (finish), for the Mills River location Medical Office Building, and to authorize staff to proceed with the Henderson County/Henderson Hospital Corporation Medical Office Building.

Motion: I move that the Board approve the proposal letter from LS3P Architects, in the amount of \$2,304,571, for the Mills River Medical Office Building location.

Chronic Nuisance Property – 264 Misty Mountain Drive

The Code Enforcement and Zoning Department has cited a particular parcel of property three times within the past year for violation of the County's nuisance ordinance, Chapter 52 of the Henderson County Code. The property is listed in the geographical information system under PIN 9528786300, with the owner identified as "Joan Kilpatrick". A copy of each notice of violation was provided as part of this agenda item.

Under N.C.G.S. §153A-140.2,

A county may notify a chronic violator of the county's public nuisance ordinance that, if the violator's property is found to violate the ordinance, the county shall, without further notice in the calendar year in which notice is given, take action to remedy the violation. The expense of the action shall become a lien upon the property and shall be collected as unpaid taxes. The notice shall be sent by certified mail. A chronic violator is a person who owns property whereupon, in the previous calendar year, the county gave notice of violation at least three times under any provision of the public nuisance ordinance.

This matter would come back before the Board before a contractor was hired to clear up the property under the authority noted above.

Motion: I move that the Board give the owner(s) of the property which is the subject of this agenda item the notice provided for under N.C.G.S.§153A-140.2.

Vaya Health – Quarterly Fiscal Monitoring Report for the quarter ended June 30, 2025

N.C.G.S. 122C-117(c) requires the staff of the local area mental health authority to provide the County Finance Officer with the quarterly Fiscal Monitoring Report (FMR) within 30 days of the end of the quarter. The County Finance Officer is then required to provide the FMR to the Board of Commissioners at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the board. The County Finance Officer received the FMR for Vaya Health on August 25, 2025.

Motion: I move that the Board of Commissioners approve the Vaya Health Fiscal Monitoring Report for the quarter ended June 30, 2025.

HCPS Needs-Based Public School Capital Fund Grant Application

Henderson County Public Schools (HCPS) requested that Henderson County partner in applying for a Needs-Based Public School Capital Fund Grant to replace part of the Rugby Middle School HVAC System.

The total grant funding requested is \$397,500 for the project, which is estimated to cost \$530,000. A local match of 25% is required, \$132,500, and is anticipated to be expended from Maintenance, Repair, Technology, and Security (MRTS) funding allocated to HCPS, as appropriate.

Motion: I move that the Henderson County Board of Commissioners approve and execute the Henderson County Public Schools Needs-Based Public School Capital Fund 2025-2026 Grant Application.

2025.159 Grant Project Resolution - NC Department of Environmental Quality

Staff was pursuing grant funding for the design of the Etowah Sewer System. The North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (NCDEQ) Division of Water Infrastructure requires a resolution for their Fall 2025 grant application, due September 30. Any grant funding awarded by NCDEQ, up to \$500,000, will be used to advertise and contract for the design of the Etowah Sewer System.

Motion: I move that the Board approve the project resolution required for the Division of Water Infrastructure Fall 2025 grant application to fund the design of the Etowah Sewer system.

Correction of Motion – September 2, 2025

On September 2, 2025, the Board authorized the County Engineer to execute an agreement with WithersRavenel, Inc. to perform services utilizing the Asset Inventory and Assessment Grant (AIA) Grant for the Etowah Sewer System.

The amount set out in the Suggested Motion to the Board, as well as the amount approved by the Approved:

Board, was \$177,000. The correct total award (shown on the documents attached to the Request for Board Action) was \$177,750.

Motion: I move the Board amend the minutes of its September 2, 2025, meeting to show a contract award to WithersRavenel, Inc. of \$177,750.

Chairman Lapsley made a motion to go into the public hearing. All voted in favor, and the motion carried.

2025.160 Close an Unopened 40 Foot Right-of-Way

Planning and Property Addressing staff received a petition to close a 40-foot unopened right-of-way. Under North Carolina General Statute (NCGS) 153A-241, counties have the power to close any public road or easement not within a city, except public roads or easements for public roads under the control of the Department of Transportation.

To close any road, the Board must:

- Vote to adopt a resolution declaring its intent to close the public road or easement.
- Call and notice a public hearing on closing the road or easement, with notice "reasonably calculated to give full and fair disclosure of the proposed closing to be published once a week for three successive weeks before the hearing, a copy of the resolution to be sent by registered or certified mail to each owner as shown on the county tax records of property adjoining the public road or easement who did not join in the request to have the road or easement closed, and a notice of the closing and public hearing to be prominently posted in at least two places along the road or easement".
- Hold the public hearing, where the Board must "hear all interested persons who appear
 with respect to whether the closing would be detrimental to the public interest or to any
 individual property rights".
- Then, if the Board "is satisfied that closing the public road or easement is not contrary to the public interest and (in the case of a road) that no individual owning property in the vicinity of the road or in the subdivision in which it is located would thereby be deprived of reasonable means of ingress and egress to his property, the Board may adopt an order closing the road or easement".
- File a copy of the Board's order with the Register of Deeds.

The Board approved a Resolution of Intent to close the ROW and to hold a public hearing on this ROW closure at its September 2nd, 2025, meeting.

PUBLIC NOTICE:

The public hearing notice was advertised in the Hendersonville Lightning on September 3, 2025, September 10, 2025, and September 17, 2025. Notices of the hearing were mailed on August 18th, 2025, to the adjacent property owners.

2025.161 Rezoning Application #R-2025-08, Vulcan ETJ


The zoning map amendment, application #R-2025-08, pertains to a portion of PINs 9670-03-8082 and 9670-12-8754, which Vulcan Lands, Inc. owns. The subject area is located off Clear Creek Rd and Nix Rd. The parent parcels are currently split zoned between the City of Hendersonville and the County. The owner has requested the 16.12-acre portion of the property in the City of Hendersonville's Extra-territorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) be removed. The City of Hendersonville recently processed and approved this request. Planning Staff initiated the application on July 28, 2025, to rezone approximately 16.12 acres of land and to regulate via the County's Land Development Code.

The Technical Review Committee (TRC) reviewed this application during its meeting on August 19, 2025, and voted to forward it to the Planning Board. The Planning Board held a public meeting on August 21, 2025, and voted to send forward a favorable recommendation to the Board of Commissioners.

PUBLIC NOTICE:


Before taking action on the application, the Board of Commissioners must hold a public hearing. In accordance with §42-303 and §42-346 (C) of the Henderson County Land Development Code and State Law. Notice of the September 17, 2025, public hearing regarding rezoning application #R-2025-08 was published in the Hendersonville Lightning on September 3, 2025, and September 10, 2025. The Planning Department sent notices of the hearing via first-class mail to the property owners within 400 feet of the Subject Area on September 3, 2025, and posted signs advertising the hearing on September 4, 2025.



Note: Planning Staff recommends extending the Employment & Industry Character Area onto the subject area if the rezoning request is approved.







- Approximately 1,157 waterway debris sites have been identified by County staff and are awaiting FEMA approval.

Private Property Debris Removal

- ► A total of 1,839 applications were received.
 - ▶ 767 Completed or 42%
- County is working diligently with FEMA, NC Emergency Management and associated contractors for continued long-term success of the program.

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

- ▶ 131 applications submitted for landslide stabilization.
 - ▶ 6 Acquisitions
 - ▶ 54 Stabilizations
- 87 flooding/landslide acquisition applications now submitted to FEMA for review.







Roadway Repairs

- According to North Carolina Department of Transportation, 425 miles of roadway have been repaired in Henderson County since the storm.
 - This is the distance from Hendersonville, NC to Gettysburg National Military Park!
- Repairs continue throughout the county including the coordination of efforts in the Hickory Nut Gorge.


Repairing and Rebuilding

- In the aftermath of the storm the County conducted 59,400 damage assessments.
 - 1,400 were majorly damaged
 - 1,700 incurred minor damage
 - ▶ 288 were destroyed
- From October 2024 August 2024 the County has issued 722 permits for building repairs and demolitions specifically related to Hurricane Helene.
- ► Almost 300 Certificate of Occupancies have been provided to residents.

Community Partnerships

- Henderson County is partnering with the Disaster Recovery
 Partnership for long-term recovery needs.
- The Disaster Recovery Partnership is a coalition of 50-member nonprofit organizations which fill with gap in resident needs.
- Additionally, over 500 residents have visited the Multi Agency Resource Center hosted at the VFW.

B. Construction Projects Update

Bryan Rhodes and Chris Todd provided the Board with an update on construction projects throughout Henderson County.

BRCC MRTS Projects – Programming is underway for the Facilities Building. Henderson County staff, BRCC, and the design team are collaborating to address the City of Hendersonville's utility extension requirements, ensuring the selected site is suitable for new construction.

Henderson County Public Schools MRTS Projects

- Tarheel Paving is the contractor for multiple paving improvement projects. Work is planned at Hendersonville Elementary, Glenn Marlow, Fletcher Elementary, Clear Creek Elementary, Apple Valley, and Flat Rock Middle, with all improvements scheduled for completion by the end of September.
- Bonitz Roofing is the contractor for multiple roofing projects. Work is planned for West and East Henderson High Schools.
- Johnson Controls is the contractor for HVAC projects at Apple Valley, Flat Rock, Hendersonville Middle, North Henderson High, West Henderson High, and Rugby Middle.


Mr. Rhodes provided updates on the schedules for the Medical Office Building at the Spartanburg Highway location, the JCAR Courts, and the Sports Complex.

- Selected architectural firm presented for approval on October 15th.




CDBG-DR ALLOCATION BREAKDOWN



HUD REQUIREMENTS

- HUD identifies Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) areas for the grantees & requires that at least 80% of the CDBG-DR funds are spent in these areas
- HUD requires that at least 70% of CDBG-DR funds must benefit Low to Moderate Income (LMI) households and communities
- An action plan outlines the proposed use of Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funds
- Grantee must comply with federal laws procurement, environmental, housing, etc.

INTRODUCTION

Program Mission

The Renew NC Single-Family Housing Program is North Carolina's long-term disaster recovery effort to address remaining unmet owner-occupied, single-family disaster recovery needs in areas impacted by Hurricane Helene by providing housing and mobile home rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, or, in some cases, reimbursement.



Program Administration

Renew NC is a program delivered through the North Carolina Department of Commerce Division of Community Revitalization, funded by a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) grant.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What can the program provide applicants?

 The program seeks to repair, reconstruct, or replace Helene-damaged, owner-occupied single-family housing. It is expected that the program will mostly be reconstructing homes.

What kind of finishes will the program provide in homes it repairs or reconstructs?

· The program will be providing contract grade finishes to program houses.

RENEW NC SINGLE-FAMILY HOUSING PROGRAM

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Applicants must meet **all** the following criteria to qualify for the program:

- The applicant must have owned the damaged property at the time of Hurricane Helene, September 27, 2024, and must still own the property.
- ✓ The applicant must have occupied the home as a primary residence at the time of Hurricane Helene, September 27, 2024.
- ✓ The property must have been damaged <u>as a</u> <u>result of Hurricane Helene</u>.

- ✓ The property must be an eligible structure type.
- √ The applicant must be current on their property taxes or on a payment plan in good standing.
- ✓ If there is a mortgage on the property, the mortgage must be in good standing.
- ✓ The applicant's household must qualify as lowto-moderate income, with a combined annual household income of no more than 120% of the Area Median Income, adjusted for family size.






