
Edge is an initiative led by the Urban Libraries Council and developed by a national coalition of leading library and local government organizations with support from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The toolkit provides a national set of benchmarks for public libraries to evaluate their technology services, and includes resources, recommendations, and tools for strategic planning and community engagement.

The Henderson County Public Library has been utilizing the nationally developed *Edge Toolkit* since 2014 to better identify technology needs within each of our facilities and improve services to our unique populations. This month, the library received national recognition of our successes and was profiled in the *Edge* newsletter and online website.

Our initial analysis using the toolkit identified three main areas that needed to be addressed: internal culture and services for individuals with disabilities, digital literacy services, and community partnerships to address workforce and economic development.

The *Edge* profile recognizes the strides we have made over the past three years to


All patrons who register for a new card during the month of September will have the chance to enter into a drawing for a Kindle Fire or Kindle Fire Kids Edition.



Proctoring is available:




ECLIPSE EVENTS A HUGE SUCCESS



A big thanks to *Lisa Donaldson*, Youth Services Librarian, for writing the grant and organizing such wonderful activities.

The library distributed 1,000 eclipse viewing glasses to patrons thanks to a grant from STAR Library Network. Leiby from Pisgah Astronomical Research Institute presented the science of the eclipse to a capacity crowd 10 days before the eclipse.

Hands On! Hendersonville provided educational fun for all ages just before patrons gathered on our field to witness what historians declared to be the most documented event in history.



MINDKARE BEHAVIOR HEALTH KIOSK

The library has partnered with Vaya Health to increase awareness, reduce stigma, and increase access to care regarding common and treatable mental health and/or substance use disorder conditions by installing a Mindkare Behavior Health Kiosk at the Main Library. The kiosk allows persons to self-determine potential needs by completing a confidential screening assessing six mental health issues: anxiety, depression, post-traumatic stress disorder, bi polar disorder, eating disorders, and alcohol and substance abuse disorders. According to Vaya, the kiosk “is not a diagnostic tool. It is only a recommendation for seeking support and help.”



This partnership is one way the library is seeking to join with community agencies to increase health awareness within the community. In addition to the screening offered at the physical kiosks, persons may access the Vaya MindKare online mental health

and substance use disorder screening from their mobile device or in the privacy of their own home.

Health Fair

ROBERT MORGAN

shares his story of the bookmobile

I will never forget my first glimpse of the Henderson County Bookmobile... There was so much to choose from it made me dizzy. And the books were there for the taking... From that bookmobile I checked out *Farmer Boy* and *Little House on the Prairie*. Later I discovered Jack London's *White Fang*, *Dog of the North*, and *Call of the Wild*... I read these books in odd moments between milking the cows and feeding the chickens. I read in my room on rainy days when we could not work in the fields. I read at night under the single bulb overhead light in my room. From the hot, sweaty, repetitive work of the farm I escaped into the thrilling world of the West, and the Yukon... Mrs. Keeling and the other bookmobile assistants brought me books month after month. They brought books they thought might interest me... The debt I owe to Emily Keeling and Henderson County Public



Library is enormous... Without their services and timely help I might not have been able to do the work I needed to do at that time, and when the opportunities came I might not have been prepared.

HOW TO SPOT FAKE NEWS



CONSIDER THE SOURCE
Click away from the story to investigate the site, its mission and its contact info.



READ BEYOND
Headlines can be outrageous in an effort to get clicks. What's the whole story?



CHECK THE AUTHOR
Do a quick search on the author. Are they credible? Are they real?



SUPPORTING SOURCES?
Click on those links. Determine if the info given actually supports the story.



CHECK THE DATE
Reposting old news stories doesn't mean they're relevant to current events.



IS IT A JOKE?
If it is too outlandish, it might be satire. Research the site and author to be sure.



CHECK YOUR BIASES
Consider if your own beliefs could affect your judgement.



ASK THE EXPERTS
Ask a librarian, or consult a fact-checking site.


LIBRARY SYSTEM JOINS COUNTY QUILT BLOCK TRAIL

Five library branches now boast quilt blocks designed specifically for the communities they serve. The Main Library is joined by Edneyville, Etowah, Fletcher, and Green River branches as official stops on the Henderson County Quilt Block Trail.

The trail began as a partnership between the Western NC Quilt Guild and the Henderson County Tourism Development Authority “as a way to preserve our

heritage and promote beautiful art throughout the county.”

The library joins other organizations including the Flat Rock Playhouse and Blue Ridge Humane Society in supporting the art of quilt making.



Each library block design incorporates at least one book to boast the library’s dedication to literacy for all ages. All five blocks were made possible by donations from the Lawrence and Florence Vanderberg Foundation.

SPANISH STORYTIME RETURNS (in collaboration with El Centro)



ASHEVILLE ART MUSEUM STORYTIMES AT ETOWAH



This summer, teens had fun learning to make upcycled journals, how to survive in the wilderness, explored radio astronomy, had fun making healthy snacks, created their own roller coasters, cracked the code to open the breakout box, learned to rug hook, and more! 176 teens entered reading logs for a chance at a prize. A guessing game winner from each branch won a gift card to Epic Theaters and two grand prize winners each received a Kindle Fire.

ADULT SUMMER READING PROGRAM

For the fourth year, the library offered adults a chance to join in summer reading fun. Adults recorded the number of hours they read by completing a reading log. Each participant who read at least 5 hours was eligible for prizes including one of six Kindle Fire HDs and local business gift cards.

This year, 1,596 adults completed reading logs for a grand total of 7,980 hours read! In addition to reading logs, the library hosted many activities designed to "Build a Better World" including a musical travelogue program, an informative program on hiking for families, and movie matinees taking viewers to other worlds.


