You count in NC! Why the 2020 Census matters!

The U.S. Constitution requires a count every 10 years of EVERY person living in the United States. An accurate count is vitally important to North Carolina and Henderson County as Census data determines:

- ⇒ Number of congressional seats
- ⇒ Amount of federal funding received annually = \$1,828 per person
- ⇒ Planning for resident needs including schools, emergency services, food assistance, housing assistance, library services and more



Census results directly impact libraries by determining how much Library Services Technology Act (LSTA) funding will be available on an annual basis. These grant funds are allocated to libraries across the state to enhance services, collections and staff knowledge. Henderson County Library has been awarded over \$175,000 in LSTA funds over the past few years to implement RFID technology, join the NC Cardinal consortium, add titles to our collections and allow staff to attend training throughout the region.

RESPONDING TO THE 2020 CENSUS IS EASY, SAFE, AND IMPORTANT.

Beginning in mid-March individuals can respond:

- Online using a computer or mobile device
- By telephone
- **♦** By completing a paper questionnaire

In this column we feature books and authors with regional appeal to Western North Carolina and more broadly, with a strong sense of place in the Southeast. Place any of these on hold at the library through the NC Cardinal catalog.

In the gritty thriller <u>Blackwood</u> by Michael Farris Smith, Mississippi kudzu is a curtain obscuring something menacing and eerie to a junkyard sculptor. In <u>The Bramble and the Rose</u> by Tom Bouman, danger intensifies as the leads get hotter for a small-town cop investigating a headless stranger found in the local woods. For a supernatural fairy tale that's been compared to contemporary southern classics like Jesmyn Ward, Daniel Woodrell, and Wiley Cash, pick up a gothic horror novel where a sheriff and preacher are not the good guys in *The Boatman's Daughter* by Andy Davidson.

For a sweet holiday romance, <u>Christmas Angels</u> by Nancy Naigle involves a winning auction bid on a country inn located about 2 hours west of Charlotte. As an agritourism holiday murder mystery, <u>Apple Cider Slaying</u> by Julie Anne Lindsey is part of the Cider Shop Mystery series. Laura Childs' Charleston Tea Shop Mystery series flows from a hunting mishap in <u>Lavender Blue Murder</u>, and continuing the Blue Ridge Library Mystery series, a small town librarian is called to serve when a skeleton is discovered at a local farm in <u>Bound for Murder</u> by Victoria Gilbert.

In two especially local new books, a woman haunted by dreams depicting crimes rekindles an old flame to stop the real-life killer in Leanna Sain's romantic thriller <u>Hush</u>, and Rosman's Pisgah Astronomical Research Institute is the hook in Mark de Castrique's private eye novel <u>Murder in Rat Alley</u>. A new North Carolina series begins in fictional Swann County with an ex-military investigator looking at crimes and character drama going back decades with *A Dredging in Swann* by Tim Garvin.

A handful of top picks for this season are a forthcoming book about an exotic wildlife sanctuary run by veterans by North Carolina author Taylor Brown called the *Pride of Eden*, and a suspenseful read for fans of Jodi Picoult called *Wildland* by Rebecca Hodge in which a wildfire causes a family to flee their Blue Ridge Mountain getaway. Therese Anne Fowler writes about a clash between neighbors and values in North Carolina's suburbs in *A Good Neighborhood*, and local author Mark Powell has a literary thriller with themes hauntingly similar to current events playing out between Ukraine, Russia, and the United States with *Firebird*. In *Wilmington's Lie*, David Zucchino reframes a lesser-known event from North Carolina history as a coup that aimed to counter the rising political power of African Americans in the decades following the Civil War. I am currently enjoying a book of short

stories set mostly in Appalachia by Michael Croley called *Any Other Place*, but for anyone curious about the literary heritage of the region, I would encourage you to check out *Step into the Circle: Writers in Modern Appalachia*, edited by Amy Greene and Trent Thomson for a survey in words and pictures of notable authors.

Students simply provide their student ID numbers to checkout books and audiobooks at any Henderson County library location. Students can also access


databases, eBooks, and digital audiobooks from anywhere, 24/7.






Patrons with hearing devices equipped with a telecoil (t-coil) can use the Kaplan Auditorium's **Hearing Loop to take** advantage of the full experience.

FRIENDS' BOOK SALE TO BE HELD THIS SPRING

The Friends of the Library – an all-volunteer organization that supports library programs and purchases books and many other materials – will hold a regional book sale in May. The spring 2020 sale will be on May 1st, 2nd, 8th, and 9th. The sale is at the Friends building at 1940 Spartanburg Hwy in Hendersonville (next to Dollar General).

The Friends raise almost \$100,000 a year, mainly through book sales in May and September. Last year, we sponsored 130 programs and purchased 1,000 books for the library. We also bought tablets, AV items, materials

for the Craft Club, and furniture and equipment such as chairs, security cameras, and shelf units.


