




## Vanessa Warmingham, Circulation Assistant

# REGIONAL

In local author events, the library hosted the release of Ann B. Ross's new book, *Miss Julia Raises the Roof* and Amy Duernberger with *Exploring the Southern Appalachian Grassy Balds*. Jennifer McGaha visits the library on Thursday, June 14<sup>th</sup> at 5:30pm to discuss her bestseller memoir *Flat Broke with Two Goats* (see article at right for more info). For a brief time in the 1930s, The Great Gatsby author F. Scott Fitzgerald made Hendersonville his home and a new novel *Another Side of Paradise* by Sally Koslow fictionalizes the author's drinking and infidelity in the years that followed. Another author whose debut *Summit Lake* was eerily similar in the setting and name to Tuxedo's Lake Summit, Charlie Donlea has a new thriller *Don't Believe It*.

Cold Mountain author Charles Frazier's new book is about a reluctant bride of the Confederacy called *Varina*. For something closer to home in local historical fiction, read a recently republished *The Land Breakers* by the late Asheville historian and novelist John Ehle who passed away this spring and a new book by Taylor Brown, *Gods of Howl Mountain*. Additional Southern gothic novels to check out are *Country Dark* by Chris Offut and *Heaven's Crooked Finger* by Hank Early.

Even more regional titles include Janet Beard's take on the Hidden Figures story, *Atomic City Girls* about the secret lives of Oak Ridge, Tennessee. Civil Rights in Winston-Salem take center stage in Elaine Neil Orr's *Swimming Between Worlds* or try *Treeborne* by Caleb Johnson, about a black orchardist and the many layers of history in Alabama. In a dark and literary look at the War on Terror, try *Small Treasons* by NC author Mark Powell, or for something on a lighter note, there's a book of stories by Lauren Groff called simply, *Florida*.

Lastly, it wouldn't be summer without beach reads and some light romance.

Andrews about an eccentric millionaire fits the bill, and Denise Hunter's

Blue Ridge Sunrise and Honeysuckle

Dreams are both part of a new series.



**Legal Information Reference Center** gives patrons access to thousands of legal forms from all fifty states and the contents of over 500 legal reference books.

**Hoonuit** is an adult learning resource with an emphasis on technology and career learning. Hoonuit courses are built around short video lessons and include topics

such as business writing and using Excel 2016.

This summer, staff will host multiple sessions across library locations to introduce patrons to these great new resources.



Registration is <u>required</u> and opens August 11<sup>th</sup>.


