



FROM THE DIRECTOR'S SHELF

HELP WANTED: BAKER-BARBER PORTRAIT IDENTIFICATION

The physical Baker-Barber Photo Collection contains over 60,000 glass plate negatives, acetate negatives, and photographic prints depicting people, places, and events in and around Henderson County from 1884 to the mid-1990s. The Library's goal is to digitize, identify, and catalog all images in this collection over the next few years, making them fully viewable and searchable by the public. In order to meet this goal, the Library needs the community's help identifying individuals and families depicted in these images. In an effort to expedite identification, the unidentified portraits are being uploaded to the Baker-Barber website making them viewable by the public.

To access these unidentified images, go to the Baker-Barber website: https://www.hendersoncountync.gov/library/page/baker-barber-collection
Click on 'search collection', and then click on the 'uncataloged browse only' button. This browsable collection currently contains over 25,000 images, with more images being added in the coming weeks.

Should you recognize an individual or family simply click on the 'feedback' button in the top right corner, provide as much detail as possible, and click 'submit'.



This information will guide library staff in accurately cataloging the remaining images, thus making them fully searchable by the public.

Your assistance with unlocking the stories behind these images will allow us to share this community's rich past for generations to come.



2023 AGING IN PLACE CONFERENCE





Each fall, library outreach staff attend the Aging Projects, Inc. Aging in Place Conference held at Blue Ridge Community College. Staff share information with attendees on the library Homebound Delivery Service, Digital Library Information, and other library programs and services. This year at the conference, one of our long-time volunteers was honored with the Aging Projects, Inc. Volunteer of the Year Award.

Lucy Baines has been volunteering with the Henderson County Library Homebound Outreach program for the past 10 years. Driven by fond childhood memories of the Henderson County Bookmobile, Lucy delivers books and other library materials to nearly 20 patrons each month. In addition to deliveries, Lucy provides valuable help with many behind the scenes tasks that keep our outreach deliveries moving.

Homebound Outreach is a free program available to any Henderson County resident who has a medical reason that prevents them from visiting the library. Participants in the program are eligible to receive free monthly delivery of any library materials. The Henderson County Public Library's Homebound Outreach program was developed in the 1980s to serve patrons previously served by the Bookmobile that operated between 1951-1977. From a handful of patrons, this program has now grown to serve hundreds in nursing homes, residential facilities, and private residences. SPOTLIGHT ON THE DVD COLLECTION

During the 2022-2023 Fiscal Year, Henderson County library patrons borrowed DVDs nearly 80,000 times. Our DVD collection includes new and popular feature films, documentaries, television shows, and educational programs available for checkout. While today's marketplace labels DVD technology "old", it is easy to use and does not require special equipment and a monthly internet plan to use.

The library's collection contains titles that may not be available on streaming products or at rental kiosks. With subscription services continuously changing their content and service models, the library remains a source of reliable content. Additionally, patrons may borrow DVDs from other NC Cardinal Libraries, increasing the number of potential titles by thousands. Check out up to 10 DVDs at a time for a three-week period. Create a film festival at home, host a family movie night, or binge-watch a favorite television series.

The Girl from the Red Rose Motel by South Carolina author Susan Zurenda tackles issues of homelessness and poverty from the perspective of a homeless high school student who becomes friends with a student from a wealthy family. This novel was inspired by the author's time as a high school teacher.

The Big Game is Every Night from South Carolina author Robert Maynor is a powerful coming of age story featuring a teenage football player whose life begins to unravel after he breaks his leg during a game.

Local author Robert Morgan has recently published a new biography of Edgar Allen Poe titled *Fallen Angel: The Life of Edgar Allen Poe*. *Fallen Angel* focuses on how Poe's personal relationships influenced his life and art.

If you're looking for a fun holiday romance, check out *Bright Lights Big Christmas* by Mary Kay Andrews. After losing her job the main character finds new friends and family in New York as she sells trees from her family's North Carolina Christmas tree farm in Greenwich Village.

Dangerous Women by North Carolina author Mark de Castrique is the second book in the Secret Lives mystery series featuring retired FBI agent turned boardinghouse landlady Ethel Fiona Crestwater and her double first cousin twice removed sidekick.

A New York Times Bestseller and Oprah's Book Club Pick, Jesmyn Ward's *Let Us Descend* blends historical fiction and magical realism as it follows a young, enslaved woman in the south who is separated from family and must survive on her own.

Donna Everhart's newest historical fiction title, *When the Jessamine Grows* is centered on a rural North Carolina family who is challenged when they try to remain neutral during a time of impending Civil War.

Kinfolk by Sean Dietrich is a southern historical fiction novel about family, second chances, and country music.

Homeward by Angela Jackson-Brown is set in 1962 Georgia and features a young woman who loses her husband then becomes active in the Civil Rights Movement through the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

The American Queen by Vanessa Miller is a fictional story set in the real place in Henderson County known as the Kingdom of the Happy Land where a group of former slaves started a new community. Miller will speak at the Main Library on February 6th at 5:30pm.

Western North Carolina author Alan Gratz will speak at the Main Library on January 16th at 5:30pm. His latest historical fiction novel for young readers, *Heroes: A Novel of Pearl Harbor*, will be released in early February.




AUTHOR ALAN GRATZ



Alan Gratz is the bestselling author of nineteen novels and graphic novels for young readers. His 2017 novel *Refugee* has spent more than four years on the *New York Times* bestseller list and is the winner of 14 state awards. Alan's 2022 novel *Two Degrees* and his 2021 novel *Ground Zero* were both instant #1 *New York Times* bestsellers, and were also *ABA Indie*, *USA Today*, and *Publishers Weekly* bestsellers. His 2019 novel *Allies* debuted at #2 on the *New York Times* bestseller list and received four starred reviews, and 2018's *Grenade* debuted at #3.

Gratz will speak about books, writing, and his upcoming novel *Heroes*, set in Pearl Harbor on December 7th, 1941. 












AUTHOR JEFFREY BLOUNT

Blount is also an Emmy award winning television director. During a 34-year career at NBC News, he directed Meet the Press, The Today Show, NBC Nightly News, and major special events.

Mr. Jimmy from Around the Way is a moving account of a billionaire who falls from grace and finds salvation in helping an impoverished community come to life. Set in Washington, DC and the fictitious town of Ham, Mississippi, this important novel depicts crippling failure, self-discovery, empowerment, and the complicated possibilities of redemption.


