
RECOVERY PLAN



PLAN OVERVIEW

- The Hickory Nut Gorge Recovery Plan is a plan looking 5 – 10 years into the future
- Recovery includes restoring what can be restored, planning for future flooding events, and envisioning an improved built environment based on public input
- This plan was drafted using public input from HNG Community Group, the two community meetings, and the survey.
- The plan's steering committee voted unanimously to recommend approval by the Planning Board and BOC.

Community Plan Process



BACKGROUND

- May 5, 2025 – BOC selected Equinox for the project
- June 2, 2025 – BOC appointed nine members of the public to an advisory committee for the plan (met six times)
- July 30, 2025 – Survey was opened for community input; received 180 responses, with 70% of respondents identifying as full-time residents
- August 19, 2025 – Staff held a community input meeting - there were over 100 attendees




BACKGROUND

- September 2, 2025 – Staff gave an update to the BOC regarding plan progress
- November 6, 2025 – Staff held another community input meeting for folks to give feedback on draft plan recommendations
- December 8, 2025 – HNG Community Group voted unanimously to recommend plan approval
- January 15, 2025 – Planning Board reviewed the draft plan

SURVEY SUMMARY



PUBLIC INPUT MEETING #1

- Meeting was held in late August
- Over 100 attendees
- Received over 200 input points on activity maps
- Comments focused on:
 - Rebuilding infrastructure to be more resilient
 - Finishing the trail connections in Florence Preserve
 - Creating river access in Bat Cave
 - Implementing new, safe recreation opportunities in the low-lying areas

PUBLIC INPUT MEETING #2

- Meeting was held in November
- Over 50 attendees
- Participants prioritized recommendations they previously submitted. The top five are:
 - Strengthen Support For Volunteer Fire Department
 - Integrated Forest Recovery & Hazard Fuel Reduction
 - Bat Cave Recreation Corridor
 - Restore Stream Channel & Floodplain Along The Rocky Broad
 - Convenience & Recycling Center

RECOMMENDATIONS

- There were over 46 recommended projects based on input from the first public meeting and survey results, as well as following discussions with the HNG Community Group, Henderson County staff (EM, Planning, etc.), and the project consultants.
- The recommendations are organized by recovery theme and arranged from highest priority to lowest priority in each theme.
- The prioritized recommendations are listed as high-level summarizations of multiple projects that make up each individual recommendation.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Tier One Priority Projects are the top priority projects that both the HNG Group and the public voted as most important

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Recommendations are organized into 8 themes. A table for each theme summarizes the projects needed to achieve the recommendations.
- Potential costs are high-level estimates. A feasibility study is required to evaluate exact costs.

- Planning Board will make a recommendation for approval or denial.
- The Board of Commissioners will then hold a public hearing that will follow NC notice requirements.
- If the Commissioners adopt the plan, it does not mean that all recommendations will be implemented. Many recommendations will require further study and consideration at the Board's discretion.
